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

#### SELECTBOARD

**10/06/14.** Present: N. Tift, T. Phillips, R. Regula, and G. Fredette

Road Commissioner Phil Baker said the Hillside Road project was completed. He's waiting to hear when Fuller will pave a section of Hartsboro Road. Mr. Baker and Road Foreman Steve Lanfear reviewed the recall notice for the Kenworth.

The board reviewed copies of other town's winter road maintenance policies. The board agreed maintenance should be left to the discretion of the road crew.

Mr. Baker agreed John Squier should be called upon more often to help with snow plowing to reduce the long hours for the road crew.

Mr. Pramuk questioned what was being done to address the vandalism issues in town over the past few months. The Board had a lengthy discussion of what can and should be done.

Dick Trono of Rutland Regional Medical Center's Occupational Health gave a presentation regarding a designated physician program for workers' compensation claims. The board will review a draft designated physician policy at the next meeting.

The National Center for Electronics Recycling agreement

for the collection of electronic waste was reviewed and signed. Rutland County Solid Waste District recommended the town sign the agreement since the organization was eliminating that service.

Greg McKirryher requested, on behalf of his father Donald, the town waive the late filing penalty for not filing a Homestead Declaration by the state deadline. His accountant was unaware the form still needed to be filed even if income tax forms were not filed. The Board approved the request.

Casella Waste provided an estimate of \$8,000 to repair the trash compactor, \$325 per month to rent one for five years, \$220 per month to rent one for 10 years or \$19,386 to purchase a new one. Maintenance costs would be covered by Casella during rental periods, while maintenance costs would be covered by the town under a purchase agreement.

Wendy Savery's requests to use the second floor of Town Hall for Gilbert Hart Library events on 11/16 and 12/12 were approved.

Town Clerk and Treasurer Julie Sharon provided a report of the first quarter financials. Revenues in several areas are higher than anticipated, so income is good at this point. There are a few highway expenses (diesel and salt) that will most likely be over budget by FYE.

N. Tift indicated he would not be drawing a stipend for his work on the Selectboard.

The Selectboard approved exceeding the election budget by \$700 to code the machine for the November elections, as long as it can be offset by another line item.

The Board approved Assessor John Tiffany's request to attend a Standards of Professional Practices and Ethics workshop on October 21 sponsored by the VT Dept. of Taxes, Property Valuation and Review as well as Zoning Administrator Jeff Biasuzzi's request to attend the VLCT zoning forum on October 29 in Montpelier.

The 2015 BCBS health insurance rates were reviewed.

J. Biasuzzi was appointed to the Planning Commission.

J. Biasuzzi reported the cost of issuing Zoning Violation Notices that resulted in court action could cost the town \$1,000-\$2,000 per case. The board agreed by consensus to direct the zoning administrator to issue the violation notices at this point.

S. Switzer informed the board she had been exploring options for the Route 103 Witham property. One possible use would be a community solar project. The board directed the town administrator to continue looking into the possibility.

The board indicated there are no minimum requirements for committee members' attendance at meetings. The issue was brought from a concerned citizen.

T. Phillips informed the board he was looking at a line boundary adjustment between his property and the town's property near the transfer station.

The board had no response to Unison's letter expressing interest in a cell site lease conversion program.

The board approved to sign a resolution for the South Burlington City Council calling for a two-year cap on the Statewide Education property tax rate at 2015 levels.

**10/20/14.** Present: N. Tift, R. Regula, T. Phillips, and M. Tessier

Road Foreman Steve Lanfear said the road crew would be installing the Bus Stop Ahead signs on Route 140W and replacing the Stop sign at the Elm & Railroad Streets. John Squier will be asked if he would be available to assist with winter road maintenance.

There was discussion regarding the above ground storage tank project at the Town Garage. It will be housed on a concrete slab with a roof over it.

The board briefly discussed the condition of the town garage restroom facilities. S. Lanfear said it was a low priority project and something he could do this winter.

N. Tift extended his appreciation to resident Christian Brown who hauled garbage out of Otter Creek after recent vandalism.

Mark Pramuk asked whether any progress had been made in addressing vandalism in town. Several ideas

and inquiries have been made on curbing the vandalism. Board members agreed the Neighborhood Watch program should be revitalized. They directed S. Switzer to contact the constable and the sheriff to find out available dates for a public forum to discuss options for addressing the recent vandalism in town.

The town received a check from the insurance company for over \$5,100 for damages to the park and facilities as a result of the summer vandalism.

The Board approved the Incident Reporting, Medical Treatment and Accident Investigation policy for employees injured on the job.

The Board approved selling the old copier for \$200.

The board reviewed trash compactor rental and purchase prices supplied by Casella, Atlantic Recycling, Recycling Mechanical and On the Spot Welding. Most towns rent their trash compactors because there is no added maintenance expense.

The board expressed interest in Casella's 10-year rental option of \$220 per month with Casella assuming all maintenance costs. Town Clerk and Treasurer Julie Sharon asked to research whether voter approval was needed.

The Selectboard approved the appointment of Gary Wells to the Prudential Committee upon the recommendation of the Prudential Committee.

The board reviewed the Conservation Commission's request to erect a sign near the kayak/canoe launch. The board agreed the commission has a budget and does not need the board's permission to make purchases within the budget.

There was discussion regarding FEMA buyout eligibility for the Carol Witham property on Route 103 damaged during Tropical Storm Irene. A letter will be to her that the buyout application is due in December.

M. Tessier indicated he had some baseball equipment he would be donating for youth recreation.

A suggestion was made regarding creation of a youth conservation group to encourage young people to get

involved in working on local trails and other town projects. The board agreed this could be an initiative for the Conservation Commission.

**09/22/14.** Present: C. Macleod, M. Pramuk, D. Scranton, K. McClallen, and R. Nimitz

Lauren Eno has moved away and no longer a member, but may help occasionally.

Election of officers was delayed until the next meeting.

John McClallen mowed the Meadow with his tractor. Debbie, Kate & Carol groomed trails, Marc & John started on the Canoe Launch and Greg Macleod and Ralph installed new maps on the Kiosks. Marc cut and hauled some locust logs to reinforce the walls of the Launch ramp. Debbie painted a sign for the Beach House of rules, but also encouraging people to walk the trails.

Future Work Projects: Clean bird houses and move duck boxes. Carol to have more brochures printed.

Winter Party: Tentative date Sunday, February 15. Set up at parking area on Waldo Lane. Activities include sliding, skiing and snowshoeing, as well as, walking the trails. Free hot dogs, marshmallows, and hot chocolate. Maybe bonfire of brush pile on east side of road if Fire Dept. approves? Maybe ice skating at the tennis courts across the Creek?

**PLANNING COMMISSION**

**10/13/14.** Present: A. Tiplady D. Farmer, J. Burkett, N. Astin & J. Biasuzzi

Ann Tiplady welcomed Nathan Astin and Jeff Biasuzzi as new members of the P.C.

Ed Bove presented a revised draft of updated zoning rules, which addressed new sign rules. Members were requested to review and send comments to him before the November meeting. Other issues to consider

adding to updated zoning included casual sales, storage, outdoor pools/hot tubs, and farm buildings.

Joshua Carvajal discussed Flood Damage Mitigation Incentives for Municipalities under the new Emergency Relief and Assistance Fund. Presently, Wallingford does not (have?) River Corridor bylaws, and the Town's contribution for repairing flood damaged infrastructure is 50 percent with 50 percent from state and federal program. Adoption of River Corridor zoning could reduce town contribution to as little as 17.5 percent. River Corridor regulation; however, would likely prevent development in both the FEMA flood zone and Vermont's River (erosion risk) Corridors. As the enrollment deadline is the fall, 2015, P.C. members will be reviewing this next year.

**PRUDENTIAL COMMITTEE**

**09/10/14.** Present: S. Sendra, K. Stocker, and A. Sharp

Stephane Goulet asked to spend \$1,000 of his training budget to help with building a burn building with three other towns. This will save from having to rent one every year at \$400 each time, and it could be used several times a year. The board approved his request after some discussion.

Maureen reported that the new windows for Jim's cabin have been ordered and will be delivered soon. Jim will install them if we do not have anyone that can do it at a reasonable price.

The Prudential Committee extended the deadline, for applying for the upcoming board position vacancy, to allow for more people to send in a letter of interest. Only one person applied and the Board will send this applicant's name to the Selectboard for their approval.

The board signed off on all the monthly financial statements.

Simon Operations requested office space so they can train on the computer and complete their monthly reports that now have to be sent online. They will use the office on Fridays if it is acceptable with the Town Clerk.

Maureen reported that the Delinquent Tax Collector had collected over \$13,000 last month. Total

delinquencies are now under \$5,000. Scott stated that the board is very grateful to Julie Sharon for the time and effort she has put into this job, and they really appreciate all she has done.

#### WALLINGFORD ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

**10/02/14.** Present: K. Fredette, S. Pytlik, J. Rodgers, and P. Rondinone

Cheryl Maniery gave an update on the after school program and the progress of world language program. She is hoping to have Mill River French 6 students help with the program.

Principal's Report: The roof over the east wing is complete! All the teachers participated in a 90-minute presentation on EngageNY, a common core aligned math program. Units were developed which would meet the common core standards. The teachers are excited to have a program they can use as they were spending a great deal of time pulling other materials together.

J. Rodgers, T. Lidstone and S. Pytlik have been doing a fabulous job getting ready for the 2015 winter sports program season. Details and busing concerns were discussed.

Enrollment is still at 143.

The percent growth of MAP and NECAP testing scores, over a year, were shared.

Board Chairs (if available) and Superintendent will be attending the VSA/VSBA Fall Conference at the end of October and Board members are encouraged to attend the VSBA Regional Meeting on 10/6/14 at Otter Valley Union HS.

The Board discussed an issue of people smoking on school property.

The kitchen equipment has been ordered. The board reviewed a contract for Clerk of the Works for the project. Art Usher was hired for a fee not to exceed \$10,000.

No negotiations update reported. The board discussed the negotiations process.

Executive session was held to discuss the negotiation or securing of real estate purchase options. No action was taken.




On September 14 the First Congregational Church of Wallingford dedicated its newly restored church steeple following morning worship.


**OCTOBER WALLINGFORD ELEMENTARY PRE-K NEWS**

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
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
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
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
