

Snowplowing Reminders

It is unlawful to plow snow across a town highway or street in a way that leaves snow in the roadway. Violation of this law may result in a \$100.00 fine plus the actual costs of repairing any damage resulting from such obstruction of the highway. (Title 19 V.S.A. 1105).

**Deadline for submission to the Wallingford News
is the 23rd of each month.**

It is unlawful to cause water or ice to run onto a town highway or street in such a way that it causes damage to the highway or street, obstructs traffic, or creates unsafe conditions. (Title 19 V.S.A. 1111).

The Town of Wallingford is not responsible for vegetation, structures, fences, or mailboxes within town highway rights-of-way damaged during snowplowing. (Title 19 V.S.A. 904, 1111).

MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

{Please note that these meeting minutes are a brief summary and are not the final approved version.}

SELECTBOARD

01/05/15. Present: N. Tift, T. Phillips, R. Regula, M. Tessier, and G. Fredette

There was a discussion about paving priorities for this summer.

Road Commissioner Phil Baker said the state would no longer be plowing the parking areas and spaces along Route 7.

The Highway Budget was compiled. There was extensive discussion on budgeting for a new vehicle for the highway department.

Lister Dave Ballou recommended the town put \$10,000 in a reappraisal fund in anticipation of a state-mandated reappraisal within the next couple of years. He said best estimate for a reappraisal would be \$130,000, but he cautioned that number could go much higher. Based on the current balance in the reappraisal fund, plus the annual payment from the state, the Board approved this new line item. It was noted, though, that the board would revisit that decision at the next meeting if the budget's bottom line is higher than anticipated.

The Public Safety budget was compiled after lengthy discussion with Rutland County Sheriff Stephen Benard and Constable Jerry Tift.

The Department of Taxes equalization report shows the Town's equalized education property values at \$217,628,000, a coefficient of dispersion of 14.71%, and a common level of appraisal of 110.18% effective 1/1/15.

The Administration, Insurance and Revenue Budgets were compiled.

The cell tower upgrade request was discussed. AT&T will be informed that the town was not interested in changing the configuration of the clock tower.

S. Switzer will obtain hourly rates from area attorneys for municipal legal services.

01/20/15. Present: N. Tift, G. Fredette, R. Regula, T. Phillips, and M. Tessier

Town Moderator Jay Kenlan reviewed the proposed warning.

Town Clerk and Treasurer Julie Sharon reported the proposed budget was up 2.9% percent; however, the amount to be raised in taxes is less due to increased revenues. She estimated the municipal tax rate would

be .2922 compared to the current tax rate of .2944 based on last year's grand list. The Board approved the proposed budget and warning.

Quarterly Financials also reviewed with several revenue line items higher than anticipated. There are minimal expenditures over budget with a few substantially under budget at this time.

The Board reviewed hourly rates submitted by three attorneys and voted to hire Gary Kupferer as the town attorney, if and when needed.

The state's Certificate of Highway Miles was approved without changes.

The board agreed to invite AT&T representative Eric Kallio and Preservation Trust officials to next meeting to discuss a proposal to install six new antennas in the clock tower.

The Board accepted the resignations of auditors Joan Tift and Eileen Tessier due to their spouses on the Selectboard.

The board discussed Earth Waste's request to submit a proposal for privatizing the transfer station. The Board was not in favor due to existing contracts with Casella Waste Systems for Zero Sort recycling and leasing the trash compactor.

The town has booked a roadside mower for the first week of September since there were no weeks available in July and August.

The Board approved sending a letter to Casella Construction regarding compensation for a damaged culvert on Deerfield Drive.

There was some discussion regarding the purchase of compost bins for resale to townspeople. The board agreed to revisit the matter in the future.

01/12/15. Present: M. Pramuk, C. Macleod, D. Scranton, and R. Nimitz

PLANNING COMMISSION

01/12/15. Present: A. Tiplady D. Farmer, J. Burkett, N. Astin & J. Biasuzzi

Ed Bove presented a revised draft of changes proposed for zoning rules, which included P.C. member input and comments from Decembers' meeting. He presented a final version of the corrected zoning maps, and noted some minor adjustments still needed in several specific locations.

A review of the latest draft of zoning rules revealed a number of typo & grammatical errors. Definitions and rules for Conditional Use, Campers/RVs, and Signs were all discussed. The addition of a requirement to any building permit application to include information on pre-existing water supply and septic systems, or an approved VT Waste Water permit for new systems, was suggested.

Other issues reviewed were casual sales, storage, outdoor pools, and changes in dimension standards for the Neighborhood Commercial zoning district.

RECREATION COMMITTEE

11/25/14. Present: L. Marchinkoski, D. Baker, T. Nash and J. Lattuca

The committee discussed lifeguard and concession worker wages for 2015.

Lake Elfin will remain open for 9 weeks in 2015 running from June 20th to August 22nd.

The summer recreation program will run for 5 weeks. During the program, there will be 2 lifeguards on duty.

The committee proposed a second lifeguard be available for the four weeks after the recreation program ends as well as every weekend. The second lifeguard could be in a "on call" status for \$15 for the day, and if called in, the rate would then be the normal

rate per hour. The proposal will increase the lifeguard budget to meet the total amount that could potentially be used if a second lifeguard was always on duty. It is expected that on rainy or slow days, these funds wouldn't be spent.

The committee proposed the need to budget for lake supplies, such as, new buoys, rope and sand for the beach.

T. Nash spoke with a representative from Stafford Technical Center about having students build the pavilion at the lake. They would not be able to start until next fall. No decision was made.

PRUDENTIAL COMMITTEE

01/08/15. Present: S. Sendra, K. Stocker, and G. Wells

Maureen reported that Mark Simon will renew the contract effective July 1st to match our fiscal year. We will continue status quo from February through June under the current contract. Contract negotiations will be done at a later meeting.

The monthly financial statements were reviewed and signed by all the board members.

The board reviewed the current water and sewer rates and voted to raise the water rate to \$5.25 and leave the sewer rate at \$7.00 for the coming quarter.

Budget meeting dates were discussed. Since the fire protection budget must be included the town's annual report, that budget will be reviewed on January 22nd. The lodge budget will be discussed on February 9th; the general budget on February 23rd; and the water and sewer budget on March 2nd.

Kandie stated she has class on Wednesday and Thursday evenings during February and April and asked to move the meeting night. Gary is not available on Tuesdays; therefore, the meetings will be held on the 2nd and 4th Mondays from February-April.

WALLINGFORD ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

01/08/15. Present: K. Fredette, S. Pytlik, J. Rodgers, T. Lidstone, and P. Rondinone

The Board reviewed and discussed the budget. The Board set the tuition rate at \$13,919 for FY16. Kitchen renovations were reviewed and the many changes that had to be made to schedules and the food service. The project should be completed soon.

The Winter Sports Program begins on January 8th.

Common core standards for math are being developed.

The process for a partnership with Tarrant is moving forward.

The implementation of the Fact Fluency Program is going well.

The Annual Holiday Craft fair was once again successful and raised nearly \$2,000 for the enrichment fund.

Work on Proficiency Based Learning has started.

The Winter Concert, the holiday feasts, and technology training held were reported on.

Enrollment is at 141: Kindergarten: 19, 1st grade: 12, 2nd grade: 24, 3rd grade: 16, 4th grade: 15, 5th grade: 16, and 6th grade: 18.

Discussions will be held with All Star Day Care about a partnership based on some of the requirements for Act 166. They have a waiting list and want to explore providing childcare for 3 & 4 year olds at WES once their pre-k program is finished. The goal is for the WES staff to provide the educational program, while the All Star would provide childcare.

Helen is meeting with Russell Kulas to talk and begin scheduling a mentor program at WES.

The Board had a discussion about construction project.

Request for Executive Session for bargaining council update.

Work with teacher evaluation, proficiency-based learning, MTSS (supporting students), and foreign language continues to occur.

RSSU Connect, a monthly email newsletter, will be issued by the Superintendent beginning in January to staff with a focus on outlining work underway in the RSSU and keeping staff informed and connected.

The RSSU Office will be starting work on refining and clarifying the HR processes for staff. Consistent forms, available online, will be developed for staff to use in interacting with the business office. A "Who to Contact" reference sheet for all staff will be developed.

Paul had concerns about Carousel meeting being too long and certain topics being talked about too long.

A meeting with contractors was held on January 7th; Helen, Ken, and Jay White expressed serious concerns about chronic delays and lack of communication, particularly with the kitchen project.

Ken wants to have only one board member on Food Service and Winter Sports committees and Ken was approved as the voting representative.

Ken distributed a draft letter from the VSBA to the board and administrators in response to a recent op-ed on school governance in the Rutland Herald.

The Superintendent was asked to take the draft agreement for sale of the Little Red Schoolhouse to the district's lawyers for review.

HART LINES


By now, most of you are aware of the new hours at the Library: Open Monday, closed Tuesday and the rest is the same.

VERMONT STATE TREASURER'S OFFICE UNCLAIMED PROPERTY
What is Unclaimed Property? Unclaimed property includes items such as forgotten bank accounts, uncashed pay checks, and unclaimed security deposits. It's most often in the form of money, but it can also be stocks, mutual funds, and the contents of safe deposit boxes. The property comes from many sources--called holders--such as banks, credit union, corporations, utilities, insurance agencies, retailers, and governmental agencies throughout the United States. The Vermont State Treasurer's Office acts as custodian to safeguard the assets until they can be claimed by the rightful owners or their heirs.

Go to <http://www.vermonttreasurer.gov/unclaimed-property> to check the list by name or town.

If you find property that belongs to you, please print a claim form. You must include the OID (owner number) that is listed with the property you are claiming. It is the number that is under the heading OID in the unclaimed property search function above.

If you are unable to print a claim form using the link above, you may request that a form be sent to you by clicking on the OID number of the property listed. An electronic form will appear on screen and allow you to enter your name and current mailing address. A form will then be mailed to you.

Express Claims

An express claim allows you to receive your money more quickly. It may only be used when claiming property valued at \$200 or less. To file an express claim:

1. You must be the original owner.
2. The amount must be \$200 or less.
3. You must complete & return a claim form.
4. If you still live at the address on the property listing, sign the claim form in the presence of a notary (for free at Wallingford Town Hall) and send it in. OR If you prefer not to use a notary, include a copy of a photo ID with the completed claim form and mail both to us.

- OR -

If you no longer live at the address on the property listing, provide proof you once lived at that address; a copy of a photo ID; and a signed claim form (no notary needed) and send it in; OR If you prefer, sign the form in front of a notary, provide proof you once lived at that address, and mail all to the Unclaimed Property Division.



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


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
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
