MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

(Please note that these meeting minutes are a brief summary and are not the final approved version.)

SELECTBOARD

6/06/16. Present: B. Brooks, N. Tift, R. Regula, G. Fredette, and M. Tessier

Julie Sharon was given approval to expend the necessary funds for a benefit package for an additional fulltime employee for FY17.

Road Commissioner Phil Baker discussed plans to address wash outs above the Dias house on Nash Drive. The grader and Ford 550 need numerous repairs, and YTD expenses vs. budget were discussed. Paving projects were discussed for a section of Church Street, a section of Nash Drive and part of Mill Street. Two winter sand estimates were reviewed with the lower bidder, Pike at \$6.90, was accepted.

Sara Bourn, the low bidder, was chosen to clean the Town Hall and Garage.

The Selectboard accepted the annual financial questionnaire compiled by J. Sharon.

Letters to the unregistered dog owners will be sent with a deadline of 6/30 or else a civil ticket will be issued.

Marc Pramuk announced the Conservation Commission was awarded a \$450 grant to establish bee colonies at Stone Meadow. VLCT will be asked about any liability on the part of the town if someone had an allergic reaction to a bee sting. Mr. Pramuk also provided an update on Community Day slated for 6/18.

An update on junk vehicles on Florence Avenue was given. A letter will be sent to the owner's estate, et al with a 30-day deadline to adhere to the town's ordinance or fines would be assessed.

Following the recommendation of VLCT and the state Department of Labor, the board agreed junior volunteers would not be used for the summer recreation program.

The first meeting in July will be held on Tuesday, 7/5.

A request by Tree Warden Steve Pytlik to expend \$200 to replace trees removed in the right-of-way on School Street was tabled until it could be determined whether the tree budget would not be needed for the tennis court project.

The Selectboard signed a two-year agreement with Russell Graphics for property map maintenance; the NCER agreement for eWaste; agreed to reduce the size of the Planning Commission from 7 to 5 members temporarily to

give them the ability to obtain a quorum and proceed with work on the Town Plan; approved a request to utilize the road crew to deliver material to the Sugar Hill cemetery; agreed to respond to Dan Samson's offer to donate \$1,000 toward a flashing radar sign; and to continue the position of Town Service Officer with limited duties of petition the probate court as needed.

6/20/16. Present: B. Brooks, N. Tift, R. Regula, and M. Tessier

The Selectboard signed a one-year contract with Rutland Co. Sheriff's Department for patrol services. There was discussion regarding dispatch services and the challenges faced by the constable, who is not permitted to call in license plates during routine stops under the current arrangement with the VSP. The Selectboard agreed to also enter into a memorandum of understanding for free dispatch services on a 6-month trial basis.

The Selectboard approved the Rotary Club coin drop on 7/16 (rain date 7/23).

Rutland Co. Senate candidate Korrine Rodrigue provided an overview of her educational and professional background.

The Selectboard approved: the use of the ball field for flag football by Art Peterson this summer and \$200 towards the purchase of two mature trees on School Street near T. Upton's property.

S. Switzer reported: 1) The road issues caused by water runoff near Trudy Dias' home on Nash Drive were supposed to be worked on today per Steve Lanfear; 2) VT Railway will be contacted again about the improvements needed for the Rte 140W railroad crossing; 3) M. Downing responded to the town's Junk Ordinance violation notice (unregistered vehicles to be moved the first week in July; 4) Constable Tift to visit the Buzzell and Frederick properties in near VTel to see if unregistered vehicles had been moved or screened; and 5) VLCT's Wade Masure met with M. Pramuk to discuss liability concerns regarding the addition of bee colonies at Stone Meadow. Mr. Masure will be issuing recommendations.



The board reviewed a request by Cumberland Farms to become co-applicant on a VTrans Work Permit application for sidewalks and crosswalks related to the construction of the new store. Upon recommendation and approval by the DRB, the Selectboard also approved it.

The Selectboard approved the roadside mower rental agreement and M. Pramuk's request to donate an Elfin Lake season pass to Forester Kyle Mason, who led a guided trail walk during Wallingford's Community Day.

Annual employee performance evaluations were reviewed and various raises effective 7/01 were approved.



CONSERVATION COMMISSION

05/23/16. Present: M. Pramuk, D. Scranton, D. Klock, C. Macleod, J. Burkett, and R. Nimitz

The WCC gave out 132 bags to 92 participants on Green Up day, down from last year.

Marc and Carol attended an Organic Diversion workshop, but found that the presentation was mostly about their organization without specific information about the process.

Plans for Community Day on 6/18 were discussed.

Marc cut up three downed trees at Stone Meadow and posted new pictures on the parking area kiosk.

The Road crew removed the large boulders at the parking area including the one that was to be carved for the sign. We'll have to find another alternative.

Plans for a work day on 6/8 were discussed.

There is \$238 left to spend in this year's budget.

Marc is optimistic about getting the \$450 grant to help set up the bee hive project. Kathy Upton has donated Peter's old equipment to get us started.

Potential sites will be toured on 6/8 for a possible dog park.

The junk cars on Florence Avenue were discussed.

MR students may participate in adding decorative inserts into chain link fence to hide unsightly dumpsters and compacter at the Transfer Station.

PLANNING COMMISSION

06/13/16. E. Berner, J. Biasuzzi, C. Martin, and J. Burkett

Jeff reported on the vehicle charging station grant opportunity. He asked Cumberland Farms about it but there was no feedback. The overall interest in the other Towns Jeff works for also showed little interest. No further action will be taken.

Jeff relayed inquiries from SameSun were only a polling of which towns had adopted siting and screening ordinances.

T. Wheeler asked for an update on the issue of the Industrial Zoning District in South Wallingford. Jeff explained the (lengthy) statutory process of amending a municipal ordinance; however, it is the PC's priority to update the Town Plan, as the plan is approaching a deadline. Then with the updated Town Plan as a guidance document, a number of corrections and new ordinances

(such as alternate energy siting & screening) would be included with the Industrial rezoning. Jeff reemphasized the time-consuming, delayed even further by a minimal PC membership and attendance with no one stepping forward. He feels the redesignation may need legal and surveyor services to define the original 50 +/- acres. The Selectboard would need to approve this expenditure.

Jill expressed frustration about the unregistered vehicles behind the VTEL building on Route 7S. Despite judicial tickets being issued; the situation persists.

Erica suggested each member research a specific section of the existing Town Plan and other recently updated Town Plans and draft updated language for discussion at the next meeting.

Jeff noted that the required reference maps would need to be requested of RRPC.

PRUDENTIAL COMMITTEE.

05/25/16. Present: S. Sendra and K. Stocker

Don Emery spoke about a section of sidewalk in front of his walkway that is very low, and any time there is a real hard rain, he can't use his front walkway as it fills with water. He has talked to VTrans about this so when they pave Route 7, they are going to put a berm along the front that hopefully will help this situation. The board plans to visit his property to take a look at the sidewalk.

Maureen reported that the plumber will be back this week to finish fixing the hand sink in the kitchen.

Kandie stated that she is going to talk with Charlie Gauthier about his seat on the board to see if he wants to stay on or resign. She will report back at the next meeting.

Maureen reported that the fire department would like to replace three pagers this year and continue each following year until all have been replaced. This request was approved by the Board.

Maureen distributed copies of the three bids for cleaning the office. The Board agreed to approve the same cleaner that is being recommended by Julie Sharon to the Selectboard.

06/08/16. Present: S. Sendra and K. Stocker
Maureen let the board know that the plumber would be at the lodge this week to finish putting the hand sink in the kitchen that he has been working on due to a freeze up in the winter.

Scott gave an update of the inspection of the sidewalk in front of Don Emery's home. It is clear that this issue isn't a 'sidewalk' issue; it's a storm runoff issue. Don was told to monitor the repaving closely and implore the pavers to create a small berm between the road and the sidewalk, to help keep runoff in the street and reach the storm drain. It was also suggested that if he still has problems, to implore the town to put a 4" pipe from the end of the sidewalk to the storm drain 20' away.

Maureen informed the board she had talked with Charlie Gauthier. He has resigned from the Prudential Committee due to his health. The board asked Maureen to post the position until it is filled.

The fire department would like to purchase a radio that will give them better call reception. Upon their recommendation, the board approved the purchase.

The board reviewed the paperwork that Maureen completed for the firefighters stipend and approved the issuance of the checks. Maureen will ask the Chief and Deputy Chiefs to attend a meeting to make some changes on the point system to make things a little easier.

The board reviewed the monthly financials and signed off on them.

WALLINGFORD TOWN SCHOOL DISTRICT

05/16/16. Present: K. Fredette, J. Rodgers, P. Rondinone, and B. Behrendt

The Board opened the bids for the school roof from Vermont Roofing and Doxsee Roofing. The bid from Premier Roof Solutions was late and not considered timely. Vermont Roofing (low bidder) was awarded the job.

Tracey Tinsley will be offered the Physical Education position at .6 FTE.

MILL RIVER UNIFIED UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT

05/12/16. The organizational meeting of MRUUSD was held. George Ambrose was appointed Temp. Presiding Officer and Kate Fredette was appointed Temp. Clerk. Robert's Rules of Order were adopted. Jay Kenlan was appointed Moderator; Gloria Menard was appointed Clerk; and Thomas O'Brien was appointed Treasurer. The annual meeting will be held on the 4th Thursday in February. The budget of \$16,951,119 was approved by voters in March. The provision for the payment of any expenses was explained. The borrowing of money was approved.

05/16/16. Present: A. Richards-Peele, T. Heffernan, J. McKenna, A. Raymond, G. Ambrose, G. Reynolds, P. Rondinone, L. Doucette, S. Mozzer, and K. Fredette

T. Heffernan was appointed chair; G. Ambrose was appointed vice chair; and K. Fredette was appointed clerk. Meetings will be held on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays at 7 p.m. on a rotational basis among the schools in the District. Other organizational business was conducted.

The fuel bid was awarded to Champlain Valley P&H. Several items (retirement, insurance, banking, grants, committee memberships, etc.) involving the consolidation of six separate entities were acted upon.

06/22/16. Present: A. Richards-Peelle, T. Heffernan, J. McKenna, A. Raymond, G. Ambrose, G. Reynolds, P. Rondinone, L. Doucette, S. Mozzer, and B. Behrendt

After reviewing the bidding materials, the Board approved the bid from Jim Billado Roofing once proof of insurance is received. MRUUSD Office Project Bid documents were reviewed.

The chair signed the corrected tax anticipation note documents.

The board approved the application for a business credit card for the district.

The board briefly discussed the clerks and their duties and the most efficient way to accomplish the signing of official documents.

Stan briefed the board on new bank accounts necessary for athletic program and Stage 40. The chair was authorized to sign the documents at People's United Bank.

The board set the meal price for 2016-17 at \$1.50/breakfast and \$2.25/lunch for children and \$2.25/breakfast and \$3.75/lunch for adults. The contract was also renewed with Fitz Vogt.

George briefed the board on the actions of the policy committee and distributed a list of the new district wide policies suggested by the policy committee. The new policies were published in the paper and the board voted to ratify them.

George again discussed the formation of an Executive Committee. Grant will write a bylaw regarding the role of the executive committee.

Grant distributed a draft of the Mill River Unified Union School District Bylaws and it was agreed to form a bylaws committee

Stan reported that the district now has a treasurer.

The Building and Grounds Committee will meet next month. The Finance Committee will meet in August. Paul will review the pay orders before they get to the committee. The board discussed someone's concern with Andrew being the chair and the new policy regarding conflict of interest issues.

Len gave an update on the Personnel Committee who reviewed new contracts. The chair will sign new contracts for: Joli Hill as a special educator, Krista Pulie, Interim PE & Health Teacher, Matthew Jensen as a special educator, and Gary Marcy as Director of Operations, Buildings and Grounds

George gave an update on the actions of the Policy Committee. Adrienne reported on the actions of the Negotiations Committee Updates on setting up and scheduling for School Advisory Panels. David informed the board of the skills and work history of the new Director of Operations.

Following executive session, the board agreed to advise the superintendent to not accept any of the bids as presented. The board seeks cost breakdowns from vendors of the in support for their proposals. The board will consider future options for work based on information made available.

Some of the central office staff will begin moving this summer into existing MRUHS space.

The school, which was located in Wallingford for 110 years, was closed and torn down in 1975. Mill River Union High School was built in North Clarendon for high school students from Wallingford, Clarendon, and Shrewsbury.

There is a school wide reunion banquet held every year for a time to reminisce, reflect and remember. About 150 alumni and guests attend. Scholarship award winners are recognized as well that evening.

Benefits include: 1) Reduced prices on goods and services from hundreds of Vermont's private businesses (discount items could include groceries, health car supplies, movie tickets, fuel etc.); and 2) free admission to state parks, museums, and fully state sponsored events. The cost of this card is \$2.00, which is a one-time fee, and they are sold at the Town Clerk's office.



Building & Garage Sale Season

is finally here! Please check on if you need a Town Permit. Sheds, storage containers, above-ground pools, and other structures larger than 120 sq. ft. will now need a permit regardless of their construction value.

"Casual Sales" and new businesses that will be operated for more than 15 days a year will need a Town Permit, and you may be obligated to collect VT taxes. 
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WALLINGFORD RESCUE NEWS
