Snowplowing Reminders

It is unlawful to plow snow across a town highway or street in a way that leaves snow in the roadway. Violation of this law may result in a \$100.00 fine plus the actual costs of repairing any damage resulting from such obstruction of the highway. (Title 19 V.S.A. 1105).

It is unlawful to cause water or ice to run onto a town highway or street in such a way that it causes damage to the highway or street, obstructs traffic, or creates unsafe conditions. (Title 19 V.S.A. 1111).

MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

(Please note that these meeting minutes are a brief summary and are not the final approved version.)

SELECTBOARD

11/07/16. Present: B. Brooks, N. Tift, R. Regula, G. Fredette, and M. Tessier

Same Sun's Phillip Allen provided an overview of the updated solar project slated for Troy Minerals property in South Wallingford.

There was a discussion on the Witham property on Route 103 with Delinquent Tax Collector Lee Perry and neighbors about the overdue property taxes the people living in temporary housing on the site. The Board approved putting the property up for tax sale.

Bastian Auer asked if the Little League would become affiliated with the town in order to be included on the town's insurance policy. He discussed the idea with Recreation Committee Chair Trish Nash who was supportive. Board members expressed support for the idea of incorporating baseball and softball teams under the Recreation Committee. Mr. Auer said he would meet with the committee and report back to the board.

The Board agreed to request an electrician tour Town Hall to prepare a Scope of Work for electrical upgrades with the intention of going out to bid on the project.

B. Brooks opened two seal bids for a town wide reappraisal. One company declined to bid and the second letter expressed interest in assisting with data collection. Assessor Lisa Wright discussed several options for the town to pursue for a reappraisal in 2019 or 2020. After a lengthy discussion, the Board accepted Ms. Wright's proposal for a reappraisal at a cost not exceed \$70,800, which includes hiring one or two subcontractors to assist her with data collection.

G. Fredette said he would like to see the town require residents have municipal stickers on their vehicles in order to use transfer station services.

The Board went into executive session for a civil matter; no action was taken.

11/21/16. Present: B. Brooks, N. Tift, R. Regula, G. Fredette, and M. Tessier

The FY18 Capital and Town Government budgets were discussed and approved. The TS personnel are recommending eliminating the free 20-punch card given to residents and requiring stickers (for a nominal fee) on all vehicles utilizing the facility.

Road Commission Baker presented the Board with an updated culvert plan for Cumberland Farms. Mr. Baker met with Road Foreman Steve Lanfear regarding state requirements pertaining to floor drainage and wash water issues at the garage. He spoke with Brian Plumer regarding runoff on the Highland Beach's tennis court near Route 140W and the weight limit with Amy Gilbert regarding the weight limit on the Van Wyck Bridge.

M. Tessier explained that Dean McGee did not receive approval from all landowners to discontinue Mears Meadow Trail; therefore, he now wants to close just the section of the trail on his property. After some discussion, no decision was made until more research could be conducted.

The Board approved continuing with the same health insurance coverage for 2017.

At the request of the Prudential Committee, a revote of the full board was requested to fill the vacancy. The appointment failed to pass by a vote.

The Board approved the Assessor's Errors & Omission request to amend a 2016 Grand List error for the Williams parcel 0150255.

The Board approved donating a load of gravel for Green Hill cemetery,

Board members briefly discussed suggestions for the presentation of the education budget at the annual Floor Meeting in March and agreed it would be helpful if the Wallingford representatives to the MRUUSD provided an overview.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

10/31/16. No quorum.

PLANNING COMMISSION

10/18/16. E. Berner, J. Biasuzzi, C. Martin, J. Burkett, and K. Mullin

The PC welcomed Kevin Mullin as a new regular member, recently appointed by the Selectboard. J. Biasuzzi relayed that Ralph Iovino had also been appointed as a Member. As this totaled six members and even numbered panels were not recommended when voting, J. Biasuzzi offered to serve as an alternate member as needed. He would continue as Recorder as this was part of his Zoning Administrator assignment.

Discussion then focused on the Town Plan, and the new (mandated) sections that needed attention to the Plan: A Designated Village Center (Act 59), Flood Resiliency criteria, a comprehensive Energy Plan. In addition, forest fragmentation & wildlife corridors, alternative energy generation siting & screening standards, and a reviewable implementation policy need to be included.

E. Berner supplied packets on the Municipal Planning Grant and updates on the application process. The members discussed a number of questions on the application. E. Berner offered to revise the application and send to RRPC in time to submit by the deadline.

J. Biasuzzi discussed the VLCT Planning & Zoning Forum on Nov. 2nd. Interested attendees include Jeff, Kevin, Jill and Erika. Jeff is to arrange to drive a carpool to this training.

PRUDENTIAL COMMITTEE.

10/26/16. Present: S. Sendra and K. Stocker

The walk through at the lodge revealed a few things that will need to be done prior to opening up next season. The ladies bathroom floor needs to be redone so an estimate may be necessary. The floors in the main hall and front room need to be refinished. The hallway paint needs to be touched up. Overall, the place was in good shape, and we had a very busy season this year.

Scott reported on the results of the Selectboard vote regarding the appointment to the Prudential Committee. The appointment failed by a vote of 2-1. The Selectboard would like to have someone that has a little knowledge of the water/sewer system.

The Committee discussed the Wild land Grant (50/50 match) that the Fire Department would like to apply for to purchase 13 sets of wild land gear. Maureen sent this request to the three Budget Committee members as this

expense is not in the budget; she received one favorable response. The Prudential Committee approved purchasing eight sets now and apply for another grant next year to purchase the remaining sets.

Since the second meeting next month falls on Thanksgiving eve, the Board approved holding one meeting on 11/09.

11/07/16.—Present: S. Sendra and K. Stocker

The insurance inspection of the Caretaker's cabin was done now that the repairs are finished. A few small recommendations have already been taken care of.

The order for the eight sets of wild land gear has been placed and the cost is a little over \$500 with the 50/50 matching grant.

The board read information from the Secretary of State concerning the vote taken recently at the Selectboard meeting concerning the vacancy on the Prudential Committee. The Board asked Maureen to request that the Selectboard take another vote when all five members are present.

The board went over all the monthly financials and signed off on them. Maureen was given approval to pay the bills that would normally appear on the 11/23 pay order, since there is no meeting, and they will sign the pay order at the first meeting in December.

On behalf of the Fire Chief, Maureen reported they are having an issue with one of remotes for the bay doors. Ski Door is scheduled to come repair the remote.




