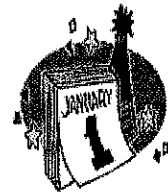

## MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

*(Please note that these meeting minutes are a brief summary and are not the final approved version.)*

## SELECTBOARD

Only one meeting held in April.

4/17/17. Present: B. Brooks, N. Tift, R. Regula, and M. Tessier

Road Commissioner Phil Baker will meet with Road Foreman Steve Lanfear to discuss summer paving projects. There was discussion about year-to-date highway expenses and plans for spending by June 30<sup>th</sup>. Roads were drying well and a North End Drive repair is planned after all frost is out. Phil would inspect Peck's driveway culvert at 2343 Sugar Hill Rd. with Mr. Lanfear to see if a replacement was needed.

The board approved the Town billing businesses for signs displayed on the ball field fence.

The Selectboard were in receipt of a petition signed by 93 residents calling for the PC to revise zoning to re-establish the industrial boundaries in S. Wallingford to the 1972 zoning ordinance. There was discussion regarding the timeline and process for responding to the petition. B. Brooks asked the town administrator to contact RRPC to inquire the impact of the petition on the Town Plan adoption process. Michael McMahon provided extensive documentation regarding zoning regulations adopted and amended by the town over the past five decades. The board tabled acceptance of the petition until the next meeting in order to give members the opportunity to review documents provided by Mr. McMahon.

The Selectboard appointed Michelle Kenny to a one-year seat on the Recreation Committee. They also approved bringing baseball and softball under the town's recreation umbrella with the town's insurance carrier to providing coverage. Rec Committee member B. Auer would oversee all aspects of the new program for the first year. There's discussion to add flag football at some point in the future. He'd also like to hire a recreation coordinator to administer recreation programs in the future. Mr. Auer also recommended starting a derelict property fund to be used to purchase real estate for recreational and other purposes.

Town Clerk and Treasurer Julie Sharon provided an overview of 3rd quarter financials for FY'17. She said revenue estimates were meeting or exceeding budgeted amounts in most cases. She noted certain highway department expenses that are over budget.

As the Fire Department and Fire District #1 agreed to become submitter in the VT Alert system, the Selectboard approved pursuing participation in this system.

The Selectboard approved: the updated Local Emergency Operation Plan; applying for a \$1080.06 safety grant through VLCT for items for Town Hall, the transfer station and the town garage; a request by Assessor Lisa Wright for Jill Teer to take lister classes using lister funds to pay for

the classes; and WES's request to use Elfin Lake for a picnic on June 6 with a June 9 rain date.

M. Tessier asked whether it would be prudent for transfer station employees to wear bright vests for safety reasons. S. Switzer responded she spoke with Jim Regula who was not in favor of it.

M. Tessier would talk to Bastian Auer about donating the \$10 per child collected for baseball and softball insurance to the town. B. Brooks would advise Mr. Auer to collect all fees and pay all expenditures and then meet with the town at the end of the season to discuss any remaining funds.

N. Tift informed the board the town's highway ordinance should be amended to include Route 140E speed limits or else the state would keep the revenue from fines. The Selectboard approved the amendment.

The board agreed Slate Valley Electric should adhere to the municipality's \$1 million workers' compensation requirement with the town paying the additional \$55 to ensure Slate Valley to meet that level.

Following executive session, the board agreed to authorize town attorney Gary Kupferer to negotiate a settlement in the Chapman case.

## PLANNING COMMISSION

3/13/17. Present: E. Berner, J. Burkett, K. Mullin and J. Biasuzzi

Joyce Barbieri discussed a change the So. Wallingford Industrial District boundaries. VT statutes require a clear letter of request to the PC for a change of existing zoning, which will then require a specific adoption process.

J. Biasuzzi suggested that this conflict with Zoning District boundaries originated because the narrative description in the Zoning Regs initially referred to the Industrial Districts only by ownership. As quarry companies added to their ownership over time, this new land area appeared to be blended into the same District. The Zoning language remained unchanged for almost four decades. Also, the maps first adopted may have never been officially updated to keep up with the increases in the quarry operations ownership.

There was discussion on the process that resulted in the 2015 adoption of the current Zoning Ordinance. Regardless, the current regs appear to have been adopted per statute, have not been legally challenged, and have now replaced any prior regulation. As the present PC is composed of new and fewer members, the difficult task of meeting the Town Plan revision deadline with the present membership was discussed. Without an approved Town Plan, it was noted that statute would prohibit any revision of Zoning regs.

Michael McMahon volunteered to serve on the PC and will submit his letter of interest to the Selectboard.

Elysa Smigielski, RRPC Planner requested a Special PC meeting on 5/17 to discuss town forum planned for 6/12. The RRPC will sponsor food and beverage. Ways to promote the forum were discussed.

4/10/17. Present: E. Berner, J. Biasuzzi, J. Burkett, K. Mullin, and C. Martin

E. Berner was appointed chair and M. McMahon was clerk. The PC welcomed new member Michael McMahon.

E. Smigielski, RRPC planner, was introduced. She presented a variety of maps that can be produced to show zoning districts using the colors recommended for each type of district and overlays such as parcels, contour lines, etc. Elysa talked with Joyce Barbieri about her concerns with the Cornwell parcel and indicated it on the zoning map in purple. She said she would not do anything further with the maps until the PC gives her its final decision on the zoning district.

Her next discussion was The Town Plan energy chapter. The Energy Committee and the PC need to work together to come up with an energy section for the town plan and to develop an Enhanced Energy Plan.

E. Smigielski discussed planned details for the June 12<sup>th</sup> forum to be held at the Rotary Building at 6 pm.

Mike distributed copies of: the '71 Zoning Maps with the physical description of each map, the '15 Maps, excerpts from the '09 and '15 Zoning Regulations describing the maps, etc. He proposed that since the '15 Regs were vague and did not describe the specifics of the maps and there were no maps attached in Town Record Books, we should go back to using the '71 Maps. Jeff and Mike will look in to the maps further.

Mike distributed documents that proved no Australian ballot vote was taken in '09 and '15; therefore, we may have to go back to the '89 Regs. After a great deal of discussion, it was decided that past approval processes were in the past. The PC is in the middle of a major rewrite of the Town Plan and Zoning reg review/update will have to take place after the Town Plan is approved.

Carol Ann Martin mentioned that she was taking a new job in Massachusetts and she may have to resign from the PC.

#### Wallingford Community Survey

The Wallingford Planning Commission is updating the town plan. They have created a town survey, as well as picked a date for the community forum. Save the Date for a Wallingford Community Dinner on June 12th. More details to come soon! Town wide survey now open! **3/22/17.** Present: S. Sendra, K. Stocker, and M. Santor

The Congregational Church was pleased that the board would like the tables they are offering. They also have 60+/- chairs if we would like them as well for the lodge. The board would look at them and make a bundle offer of \$200 for both the tables and chairs.

The South Main St. pump station has a hole on one of the tanks. Chris is getting some quotes to either fix or replace the tank. He will keep us updated as to what is happening.

Martin showed pictures of the ladies bathroom floor at the lodge and explained what was being done to fix the floor and make it level again. The work should be completed by the end of the month.

The April meeting dates will be changed to the 1st and 3rd Wednesday so Marty can attend both meetings as he has a conflict with the second meeting.

The committee read through the annual report to check for any errors before it was sent to the printer. A few changes were made. Scott will pick them up when they are ready.

The Board agreed that there will be no purchases made without prior approval of the Prudential Committee.

**4/0517.** Present: S. Sendra, K. Stocker, and M. Santor

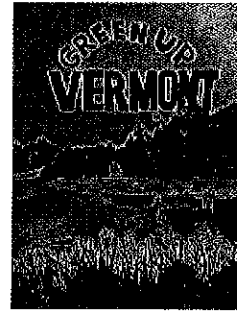
Martin gathered information on a back blade for the John Deere tractor and will send an email with the final cost once he talks to the dealer again. We would like to purchase one so we could do more of our own smoothing out of the road at the lodge and the sewer plant.

Martin presented the final invoice for the ladies bathroom floor at the lodge repaired.

Maureen reported that a new tank for the South Main Street pump station was ordered and should arrive in three weeks. Chris is also getting quotes to have the controls moved above ground.

Scott recommended using some of the fire district property to have some solar panels installed to help offset the electric cost. The board discussed that may be we would need to talk to the Energy Committee more about the cost and the benefits.

The board reviewed expenses and budget numbers to date to determine if a rate increase was needed. After some discussion, it was decided to keep the rates the same for the fourth quarter.

**TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR A PASSPORT YOU MUST BE:**

1. A legal resident of Vermont
2. Age 62 or older, or
3. A Veteran of the uniformed services-provide form DD214 or drivers license with indication (after 7/1/13).

Holders of this card are eligible for admission to Vermont state parks (overnight camping and other park fees are excluded).

The cost of this card is \$2.00 - which is a one-time fee. If the card is lost at any time, just go back to your Town Clerk and they will issue a duplicate free of charge (IF they have a copy of your application). Your card never expires!

## RECREATION COMMITTEE

**4/05/17.** Present: T. Nash, L. Marchinkoski, B. Auer, E. Tessier, and S. Taggart

Joan Lattuca has resigned from the committee.

We will need to work with her to organize the Memorial Day parade for this year.

Lisa Cotrupi and Jenn Tiffit will be returning as the summer recreation camp directors. Lisa noted that the field trips last year were difficult because of the transportation cost. We will continue to require deposits at registration so they can plan trips. The camp will be held the following weeks: June 26, July 31, August 7, and August 14. Jenn will turn in the building request form. Lisa suggested having fewer counselors so that they can get more hours. There was discussion about giving "clear" guidelines for lifeguards during their training meeting. A flyer on the program will go out before April school vacation.

The locks on the buildings at the fields need to be changed. The baseball program is currently playing under Cal Ripkin, and Bastian would like to see it fall under the Recreation Committee. The Town will receive a fee and the program will be coordinated by a Rec Committee member this year. He will ask Sandi Switzer how to accomplish this for this year. Bastian also requested that the mowing company drag the fields each time they mow.

**4/18/17.** Present: T. Nash, L. Marchinkoski, B. Auer, E. Tessier, S. Taggart, and M. Kenny

The net for the tennis courts should be installed ASAP. Bastian volunteered for this task.

The Committee approved hiring returning lifeguards Kaylen Cottrell, Emma Pells, Elizabeth Spencer (and Devyn Fortier as a substitute).

They also approved hiring Courtney Chadburn, Madison Fishwick and Ethan Welch as counselors; and Spencer Ahearn, Seamus Nauton, Alisha Mclellan and Kiera Nauton as concession workers.

Bastian received approval from the Selectboard to take over the local baseball program under the town's insurance coverage. A harrow has been purchased for the field. Catching equipment and batting helmets are needed as well. They will also be purchasing t-shirts for the program so they do not have to track down uniforms.

We will need to get quotes for repairing the cracks in the basketball court.

There are grants for forested areas, which may cover the Elfin Lake play area. We will research grant opportunities. Michelle noted there is a significant bee issue at the lake. Susan will research how to deal with this.

We would like to know who currently cares for the grass at the lake. We need to find out how/who turns on the water, electricity, telephone, and who takes care of the trash. We would like to open the lake June 24th. The committee proposes to set a date of June 17th to clean up the lake and set things up.

Trisha will get in touch with Joan regarding the organization of the Memorial Day parade. Susan will work on invitations for those to be involved. Bastian indicated that if others are not formally invited then there is not goodwill. We could include Wallingford Fire, Wallingford Rescue, Baseball, Rotary, Mill River marching band, Girl Scout Troop, and Girls on the Run.

Michelle has been talking to her neighbors, and they are interested in planning a block party.

The Planning Commission is meeting with representatives from all the town committees to put together the town plan which will be in effect for five years.

Eileen will get paint and have the Girl Scouts volunteer to help paint the dugouts.
