Explanation of Reappraisal Process and Property Inspections

The process of a town-wide appraisal is one of studying current market values for the community, the factors that impact those values, collecting data on all properties, and then applying a "model" for land and building values for the town.



Property inspections are a vital component of the process. We collect data during inspections in order to build the model for land and building values, then make adjustments for unique features of individual properties that may impact those values.

Regarding Interior versus Exterior property inspections, we strive to inspect the interior of all properties. It is the right of any taxpayer to refuse an interior inspection by the appraiser however, we recommend that it is in your best interest to allow this inspection. We do not take photos of interiors of dwellings or other buildings, and we try to be as non-intrusive as possible.

We are gathering data on number of bedrooms and baths, the date of renovation of interior rooms, measurement of interior features like half-story or basement finished areas that sometimes cannot be measured accurately from the exterior. We are also gathering data on any factors that may impact value negatively such as water in the basement, awkward layout, very dated interior cosmetics, etc. In fairness to other taxpayers who allow interior inspections, we cannot give credit for

depreciation issues we cannot verify visually from the exterior of the building.

If you would prefer to schedule an appointment rather than allow us to make a "cold call" to your home during the weeks that we will be working in your neighborhood (we will mail postcards before each section of town is visited), please call the Assessor's office at 446-2974. If your property is vacant land, we typically conduct inspections from the street or main access to the property as well as mapping information available at the town office. If there are specifics to your cant land parcel that you would like to share or if access is restricted or limited, please contact us to schedule an appointment.

The Selectboard is seeking volunteers to choose from one of six (closed) town cemeteries in Wallingford to visit and take photos, assess and make recommendations of what headstones need to be fixed, trees trimmed or removed that may be impacting headstones, or any other pressing landscaping needs. Cemeteries include: Doty, Hager, Hawkins, Hill Roberts, Pelsue, and Sugar Hill.

MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

(Please note that these meeting minutes are a brief summary and are not the final approved version.)

SELECTBOARD

10/02/17. Present: B. Brooks, N. Tift, R. Regula, M. Tessier, and G. Fredette

Town Administrator Sandi Switzer participated in a telephone conference call with a FEMA representative along with the road commissioner and road foreman. A FEMA rep will be visiting on 10/11 to review all damages as a result of the July 1 storm.

First Quarter Financials were reported. Several line items on the revenue side exceeded expectations and the expense side is on track. N. Tift will donate his Selectboard salary back to the town.

The Selectboard fielded complaints on the Witham property on Route 103. The town has little recourse until the one year tax sale redemption period expires. All agencies have been notified and the matter is in the hands of litigation attorneys. Neighbors were urged to contact state officials and press them to take action.

Reps from Troy Minerals discussed their new solar project on Route 7 that would be south of the existing Troy Minerals array.

Anne Pace raised a number of issues regarding VTrans' construction of a rail yard on Bill Fox Road near her property. VTrans rep Mark Fitzgerald provided an overview of the project. B. Brooks requested AOT keep the town and neighbors apprised of plans.

Doug Shackett and Scott Atwood provided a brief overview of plans for a mud bog at the Buzzell property on Route 7 South on 10/7 & 10/8. The Selectboard denied the request.

ZA Jeff Biasuzzi said there was a typographical error related to setbacks in the 2015 Zoning regs and asked whether interim zoning could be used as a temporary corrective measure. Board members agreed an applicant could seek a variance until the error was corrected along with industrial zone revisions during the Town Plan update process.

Board members reviewed the annual VLCT PACIF Survey.

In response to a complaint, Jeff Biasuzzi agreed to discuss with neighbors moving a section of mailboxes 18" away from his West Hill Road property.

Nick Benjamin was appointed to the Energy Committee.

At the request of Planning Commission, Carol Ann Martin and Ralph Iovino will be notified that the commission would be reducing the panel size from 7 to 5 members.

A Village Street resident extended appreciation for authorizing increased police patrols on Village Street. Another resident suggested repositioning the No Parking sign near Meacham Street.

Board members agreed reappraisal data collector Jacob Dorman should be given a set of keys to Town Hall and the assessor's office.

10/16/17. Present: B. Brooks, R. Regula, M. Tessier, and G. Fredette

Road Commissioner Phil Baker reported work has begun on Dugway Road and West Hill will start later this week. Gravel debris was removed from the Cadwallader pasture and would be used on West Hill. VTel has been asked to move the fiber optic line on West Hill. Road Foreman Steve Lanfear described damage to culverts by VTel contractors while installing the fiber optic line. M. Tessier directed Mr. Lanfear to photograph and document any damage. Mr. Baker provided estimates for labor, equipment and material to repair Dugway and West Hill Roads so the town could obtain a line of credit. Town Administrator Sandi Switzer reminded the road foreman of a complaint about a tree leaning over Dugway Road near the house at the bottom of the hill. N. Tift gave the road foreman instructions regarding the location for a 35 mph sign to be installed on Creek Road.

The Board approved sending a letter regarding updates to AT&T cell tower equipment in Town Hall.

The Board agreed to replace the TrafficLogix radar speed sign, previously approved, with an ElanCity sign estimated at \$3,250.

Michael McMahon discussed a citizen's concern regarding the September PC meeting (and planned October meeting) being held at a private residence. The Board discussed public access to a private home and directed Mr. McMahon to notify planners meetings should be held in a public building preferably Town Hall.

R. Regula said progress had been made in removing unregistered vehicles from a Route 103 property. G. Fredette offered an update from Health Officer Trisha Nash regarding the Witham property on Route 103. The Constable notified Sandi that the mud bog event was moved to Danby.

The Board agreed the TS employee must submit a physician's note allowing him to return to work. They also requested TS employees to submit written statements to Sandi regarding any work related issues that may have arose on 10/14.

PLANNING COMMISSION

10/10/17. Present: E. Berner, J. Biasuzzi, K. Mullin, J. Jankus, M. McMahon

E. Smigielski, Town Plan Specialist from RRPC, asked Mike McMahon for clarification on the South Wallingford and East Wallingford Village water systems (Fire Districts). He offered to check on details and send her his findings.

The Committee will meet on 10/25 at Erica's residence to review the most recent draft.

E. Smigielski asked for input from the Commission on several sections in the proposed town plan.

R. Iovino and C.A. Martin will be removed from their position on the Commission (unless they will begin attending meetings) so that it can become a 5-member panel, with one alternate.

J. Biasuzzi announced the next VLCT Planning & Zoning Forum is 11/1 in South Burlington. Anyone interested in attending should make a reservation though him.

From a Wallingford resident:

Somewhat new and worthwhile checking out for those needing flood insurance!! Private market flood insurance is now available in Vermont as a compete option with FEMA. A friend in East Wallingford, who would have paid \$591 for \$39,100 with FEMA flood insurance, recently found coverage is available through Lloyds of London. She asked for \$150,000 coverage and was billed \$528.50. Southern Vermonters can call Andy Shaw ((802) 362-1311) at WH Shaw Insurance in Manchester for information. Those in other areas would be best to check in with their local agents.

Lloyd's of London operates as a Surplus Lines insurer and the rates charged are not subject to approval by the State of Vermont. Lloyd's is assigned a Best's Financial Strength Rating of A (Excellent) by A. M. Best Co., the recognized authority for financial strength rating for insurance companies. Lloyds of London is licensed by the federal government—not by the State of Vermont. When the Insurance Division in the VT Department of Financial Regulation was asked for the rationale, Ellen Adams 802-828-2470 - ellen.adams@vermont.gov said the State doesn't issue an additional license to those federally licensed.

(The Town of Wallingford nor its officials provide any endorsement or recommendation of this insurance.)

CONSERVATION COMMITTEE

Budget and year-to-date expenses were discussed.

Informal mushroom walk in Stone Meadow by Janet Kennedy Farmer discussed. Discussion of possible sites for a stargazing event in October with local club.

The Planning Commission is looking for digital photos for the new Town Plan.

Brief discussion of river 50' corridor from development; recruitment of new members; and possibility of local dog park.

Work day to be scheduled at end of October or beginning of November.

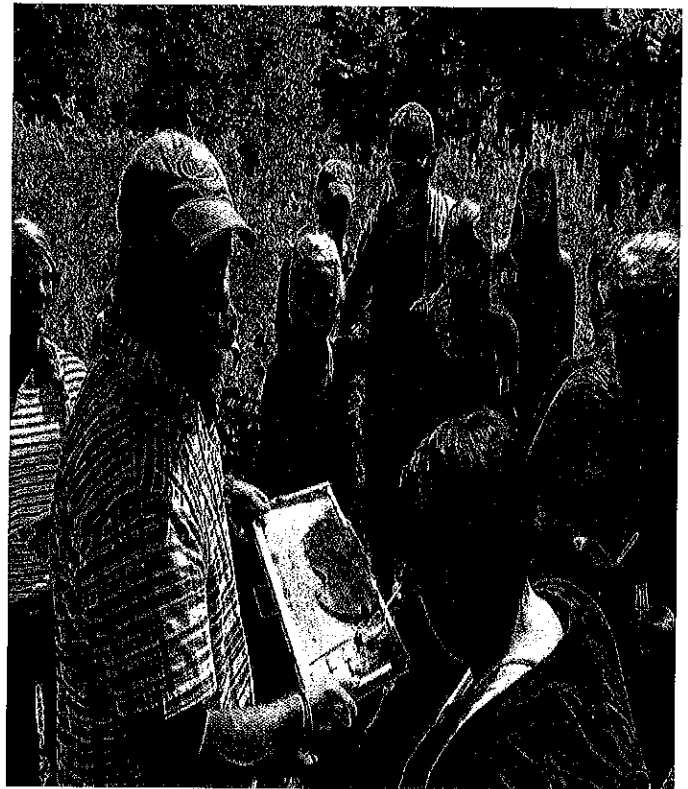
Thank You Vermont Country Store!

The Vermont Country Store, a popular and historic institution here in the state since 1946, recently has become a supporter of Wallingford Conservation! The VCS has a long history of supporting local communities. A program it created, the Community Partners program, supports employees who volunteer to enrich their communities and the lives of their neighbors by making financial donations that match the volunteer time invested.

Marc Pramuk, an employee at the VCS and longtime supporter of environmental conservation and education here in Wallingford, so far this year has volunteered 78½ hours of his time to the maintenance of the trails system at Stone Meadow, the introduction of honey bee colonies on the conservation land, and the leading of educational talks and guided hikes on the trails and tours of the bee yard. In acknowledgement of this time and commitment, the VCS has donated \$785 to the Conservation Commission to support the continuation and expansion of these efforts.

These contributions have been used to add needed beekeeping equipment, including several bee suits which have been used on several occasions to allow local families to get up close and personal when touring the hives as well as to purchase honey jars to allow the sale of honey for fundraising; to replace the nature camera along the trails at Stone Meadow, enabling us to capture numerous shots of wildlife such as several visits by a bobcat, a family of fox, a herd of deer, numerous rabbit, wild turkey, racoon, squirrel and other wildlife in the Meadow; to enable the purchase of seed and plants to add to the diversity of the Meadow; to allow the acquisition of needed tools for the maintenance of trails; and to allow the printing of educational materials on the trails and for visitors to the trails.

Employees at the VCS enjoyed Stone Meadow themselves when the company held its annual picnic at the Wallingford Lodge this summer. Several dozen employees, including members of the Orton family, were taken on a walk & talk along the trails led by Marc. They got a history lesson on the role the land has played dating from the Wallingford Pageant a century ago through its time as a sand & gravel pit up to its current use for nature conservation and education. The guided trail walk looped through numerous ecosystems that exist in and around the Meadow before stopping at the bee yard for a sampling of raw honey. Thank you, VCS, for your support and commitment to our community!



PRUDENTIAL COMMITTEE

10/09/17. Present: S. Sendra, K. Stocker, and M. Santor

The Board agreed that if the 1st of the month falls on a weekend, that Maureen can issue a check to Gary Wells on the Thursday before the 1st with the check being dated for the 1st.

Maureen reviewed the Open Meeting Law requirements. She also stated that this information needs to be given to the Fire Chief and his deputies as far as what they can send through email and whom it should be sent to.

The Conflict of Interest Policy work was tabled until the next regular meeting.

Shane St. Clair from Nash Drive asked what the State had told the fire district that forced them to install a \$3 million system. Chris Hayes of SOS, our water operator, explained in detail that the deep well system that we have is the best way to go as far as a well vs. a surface water system. Shane was upset that we were forced into a system that he feels is bad water and will not drink but still has to pay a quarterly bill to have water at his house. Chris went into detail about the fact that we more than exceed EPA standards, and it is very safe to drink. It was pointed out that the State had fined the fire district for not meeting standards and that may have been the driving factor to install the deep well system. This system was much cheaper than putting in upgrades to the groundwater. Chris will research the permit for the new system. Shane feels there is too much calcium in the water.

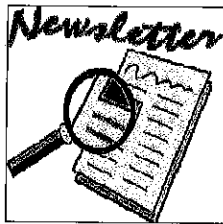

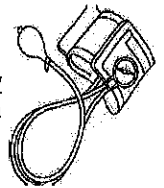

Wallingford Transfer Station is now accepting food scraps in accordance with the third phase of Act 148 that requires Transfer Stations to accept food scraps from businesses and residents. Items that are accepted as food waste include:

Fruit and veggie (please remove PLU's!!); Bread; Rice; Pasta; Meat and Fish; Bones; Shellfish; Egg shells; Coffee grounds; Coffee filters; Tea bags; Cooking oils and fats; Dairy products (includes cheese, yogurt, eggs); BROWN paper napkins and paper towels.

The most efficient and stink proof way to store your food scraps are in a kitchen scrapper. They are available for purchase at the office located at 2 Smith Lane, Rutland, Vermont. You could also store them in a plastic bag inside of a paper bag and keep it in a cool place like under your sink or in your garage. Please do not include plastic bag in food waste tote.

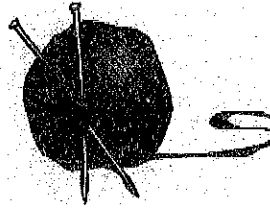

As Winter is approaching, here are some Snowplowing Reminders:

Reminder - Winter Parking Ban in effect November 15 through March 31. No parking allowed on Wallingford roads between the hours of 11 p.m. and 7 a.m.

It is unlawful to plow snow across a town highway or street in a way that leaves snow in the roadway. Violation of this law may result in a \$100.00 fine plus the actual costs of repairing any damage resulting from such obstruction of the highway. (Title 19 V.S.A. 1105)

It is unlawful to cause water or ice to run onto a town highway or street in such a way that it causes damage to the highway or street, obstructs traffic, or creates unsafe conditions. (Title 19 V.S.A. 1111)

The Town of Wallingford is not responsible for vegetation, structures, fences, or mailboxes within town highway rights-of-way damaged during snowplowing. (Title 19 V.S.A. 904, 1111)

The Highway Department requests that if you see a problem on a town road, i.e. a sink hole, a tree down, etc., please call the Garage at 446-2472. Don't assume that someone has already called in to report it. You can leave a message if no one answers, and you don't have to leave your name. It's not possible for the Highway Department to ride the roads every day to inspect them. Thank you for your help.

And lastly, the Town of Wallingford is *not* responsible for the sidewalks or street lights. Questions or concerns should be directed to the Wallingford Fire District #1 Office at 446-2964.

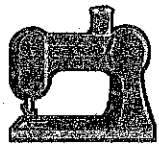

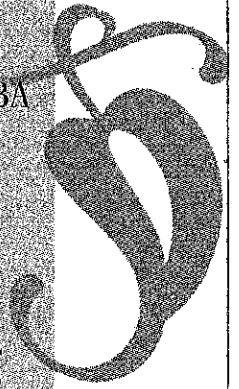
