Announcement

The Town of Wallingford now accepts Visa, MasterCard and Discover credit/debit cards to pay for certified copies, property taxes and other fees. There is no cost to the town.

Electronic payments are accepted at Town Hall, or by telephone, mobile app, or through the PayGov.us portal. (Please note, property taxes must be processed online by 4:30 p.m. EST on the due date).

PayGov.us charges a \$1 convenience fee for transactions under \$33 and a 3% charge for transactions of \$33+. For questions, contact PayGov.us at 1-866-480-8552. Homestead Declaration

Don't forget to file your annual Homestead Declaration Form HS-122 by April 17, regardless if you file for an extension!

Property Tax Adjustment

You may be eligible for a property tax adjustment on your 18/19 property taxes if your property qualifies as a homestead and you meet the eligibility requirements. The Property Tax Adjustment Claim Form HS-122 is due April 17. Late filers are charged a late fee.

Don't forget to file your 2018 Property Tax Exemption for Disabled Veterans and Their Survivors, if needed, by May 1st.

MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

(Please note that these meeting minutes are a brief summary and are not the final approved version.)

SELECTBOARD

02/05/18. Present: B. Brooks, N. Tift, R. Regula, M. Tessier, and G. Fredette

Road Commissioner Phil Baker reported the 2016 Kenworth and the one-ton needed repairs; and he wants to put a plow on the loader before the next snow storm. Mr. Baker reported that Shaw's has a 2004 Chevrolet pickup for sale at a cost of \$9,000. The Board approved the purchase after discussing the truck's features. He will follow up on Bill Owens' outstanding invoice for the West Hill Road culvert project.

S. Switzer reiterated that all road/bridge infrastructure work must abide by the Municipal Roads General Permit that went into effect 1/26. VT Local Roads is hosting a MRGP forum at Town Hall on 4/26 and the road crew should attend.

Mr. Baker said there were no special weight limits to report to the state as required.

The board reviewed and approved the Village Center Designation renewal application and maps for renewal through the State.

Possible increases to Transfer Station fees will be considered at the next meeting.

The Selectboard approved the Fire District #1's request to use the town's bulk mail permit to distribute their annual reports and to use the second floor of Town Hall for the annual meeting on 4/17.

Jenna Koloski from Vermont Council on Rural Development provided an overview of the Community visit process after the Selectboard confirmed the town was still interested in pursuing the program. She described the work that will be done to identify goals and initiatives then building action plans and pinpoint resources to accomplish those goals. The program would kick-off in late March with a meeting of the Steering Committee, comprised of 25 local residents and business leaders, followed by public meetings and a dinner with VCRD bringing a team of experts in the chosen fields to collaborate with citizens on how to accomplish their goals. Goals will be prioritized and individual task forces created. These groups would then meet with resource teams who address issues and identify funding options.

Ms. Koloski said VCRD provides the training, resources and referrals for the program. A final report would be issued in July. There is no cost to the town other than support for mailings and a community dinner.

Marc Pramuk reported on vandalism to the Stone Meadow kiosk. N. Tift offered a portion of his Selectboard salary to be used for repairs. Joyce Barbieri suggested they consider installing a shed inside the TS gates to house tools for work at Stone Meadow to avoid future vandalism.

The board agreed to set a 30-day notice of ejection for citizens living at the former Witham property on Route 103.

The board agreed to Mr. Baker's request that a contractor install a temporary road for a mound system replacement project on Wallingford Pond Road but limiting it to a 6-mo. period. He asked permission for the road crew to travel to Pike's plant in Williston for cold patch that would adhere to potholes better than local materials.

Neither of the two bee colonies survived, but plenty of honey remains. Electric fencing may not be properly grounded, with a very weak pulse.

YTD expenses vs. budget were reviewed.

There is a large bullet hole in the Stone Meadow kiosk. Est. repair cost is \$250 plus labor. The posted "rules" sign is missing and needs to be replaced.

PRUDENTIAL COMMITTEE

01/22/18. Present: K. Stocker, S. Sendra, and M. Santor

The old meter at the South Main Pump Station has been removed. Chris has a replacement motor to install and then that project is completed.

The DTC's year-end report was shown to the board, and they were very pleased with the amount of delinquencies that Julie had collected during the year. Maureen stated that a few of the names would be omitted as they have now paid their past due amounts.

Maureen reviewed the flooding issues that occurred last weekend at the Sewer Plant due to the ice jam breaking and coming over the banks. Chris went in and started up the gas-powered pumps to keep the water levels down. Chris will be coming to the budget meeting to discuss what could be done to help avoid this in the future.

Scott read in the Selectboard minutes that Mark Tessier had discussed the possibility of the town road crew helping with some of our digs to work more as a team. The Prudential Committee was all in favor of pursuing this issue further.

02/12/18. Present: K. Stocker, S. Sendra, and M. Santor

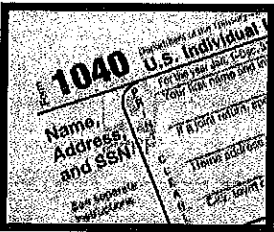
Marty explained that the state is now plowing the snow onto the sidewalks, which has caused Gary Wells to have to plow several times. Marty was told that the Town requested to have it plowed this way. However, Maureen showed the board the emails between the State and Town that show that the Town *did not* request this. Marty stated that he will be going to the VTrans office to talk to the supervisor.

Gary Wells reviewed the bids for the removal of several trees at the Lodge. The Board approved Vaillancourt's bid of \$5,000 to take down and remove 12 trees.

The Board approved the Fire Department requests to purchase a 4" hydrant gate at the cost of \$567 and three sets of LED bulbs for lights on the truck.

Maureen presented the board with two quotes, obtained by Chris, to purchase a water leak detection device. Maureen requested to apply for an equipment grant through VLCT for this purchase. The board agreed and decided to let Chris make the decision on which device to purchase.

BROC Community Action is a Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) site for free tax preparation. The VITA Program generally offers free tax help to people who generally make \$54,000 or less, persons with disabilities, the elderly, and taxpayers with limited English who need assistance in preparing their tax returns. This service also includes online filing of some of the federal returns. The program officially starts 2/1. Hours and dates are yet to be determined. 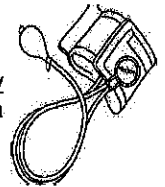

****Property Tax Exemption for Disabled Veterans and their Survivors****

The following are eligible for the exemption: Veterans receiving Disability Compensation at a rating of 50% or higher; Veterans receiving Non-Service Connected Pension (also called Improved Pension); Veterans collecting permanent military retirement pay for a medical military retirement; and Surviving spouses of veterans who had received the exemption (surviving spouses may also be eligible for Dependency and Indemnity Compensation or Death Pension).

The exemption is \$40,000 in Wallingford. The exemption reduces the appraised value of the home prior to the assessment of taxes. The exemption only applies to homes that are owned by the veteran or survivor and is the primary residence.

To receive the exemption, the veteran must provide proof of eligibility to the Vermont Office of Veterans Affairs every year before May 1st. *Veterans who are determined to be totally and permanently disabled only have to provide proof of eligibility the first year they use the benefit for a home (if they move to a new home in a different town, they will have to provide proof of eligibility again). They also must provide proof of eligibility by May 1st.

Proof of eligibility is provided to the Town by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. Our recommendation is to call the VA at 800-827-1000 no later than April 1st to request this documentation. The proof of eligibility may also be obtained through ebenefits.

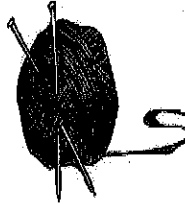

Explanation of Reappraisal Process and Property Inspections

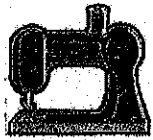
The process of a town-wide appraisal is one of studying current market values for the community, the factors that impact those values, collecting data on all properties, and then applying a "model" for land and building values for the town. Property inspections are a vital component of the process. We collect data during inspections in order to build the model for land and building values, then make adjustments for unique features of individual properties that may impact those values.

Regarding Interior versus Exterior property inspections, we strive to inspect the interior of all properties. It is the right of any taxpayer to refuse an interior inspection by the appraiser however, we recommend that it is in your best interest to allow this inspection. We do not take photos of interiors of dwellings or other buildings, and we try to be as non-intrusive as possible.

We are gathering data on number of bedrooms and baths, the date of renovation of interior rooms, measurement of interior features like half-story or basement finished areas that sometimes cannot be measured accurately from the exterior. We are also gathering data on any factors that may impact value negatively such as water in the basement, awkward layout, very dated interior cosmetics, etc. In fairness to other taxpayers who allow interior inspections, we cannot give credit for depreciation issues we cannot verify visually from the exterior of the building.

If you would prefer to schedule an appointment rather than allow us to make a "cold call" to your home during the weeks that we will be working in your neighborhood (we will mail postcards before each section of town is visited), please call the Assessor's office at 446-2974. If your property is vacant land, we typically conduct inspections from the street or main access to the property as well as mapping information available at the town office. If there are specifics to your vacant land parcel that you would like to share or if access is restricted or limited, please contact us to schedule an appointment.

Notices will be mailed out in June to every property owner with the reappraisal results. The notice will include the procedure to grieve the results.


