



The Rutland Daily Herald 1932 - **Barney W. Aldrich describes Activities at Old Lumber Camp**-By Mary Gilbert Smith

"I never expected to get lost right at home" said Barney Aldrich of Wallingford, retired lumberman, "but that's what I did when I went back to the logging camp above Little Rock pond where my wife and I spent the first 10 years of our married life."

"Nothing there is the way it used to be. All that's left of the mill is a big sawdust pile, and there's nothing to show where the houses stood. The Long Trail goes past where they used to be and through what was once our mill yard. The mountain is covered with second growth wood. The little trees that we left standing are big trees now. It was virgin forest that we cut - mostly spruce and yellow birch with a little hemlock. The trees were bigger than any you see nowadays. We got 2700 ft. of lumber out of one spruce tree and 2800 out of one birch. We drew down some logs 74 ft. long to be used for derrick poles."

"The way to the South Wallingford station, where we shipped the lumber, was all downhill. The men would bring down some awful big loads. There was great rivalry among them as to who had the best team. Every little while they'd have some kind of contest to see which team could draw or pull the most." "One team brought down a carload in one load-13,000 ft. of sawed lumber. When I offered a barrel of flour to the teamster who brought down the biggest load of pulpwood, three of them drew down 19.5 cords. A lot of people were at the station to see them come down, and Charlie Batcheller took a picture of the three loads. They were so nearly alike that each of the three drivers got a barrel of flour."

"There was always something happening on the mountain. One day one of our teamsters, Louis Bushee, who thought the world of his horses, drove them into the yard as usual. One of them caught its hoof between two stones and broke its leg. We had to shoot it, and Louis couldn't have felt worse if he had lost a child. Then another team slipped on the bridge below the mill and tipped its load into the brook. As if that wasn't enough, one of the new men sawed off the tips of both his thumbs."

"I shut down the mill for the rest of that day before anything else could happen. Really most of our accidents were not such serious ones."

"One night two of the boys who were going to town thought they'd try sliding down the mountain on a bob-sled. The sled went so fast that they couldn't make the turn where the road curved. They shot straight down the mountain until they struck a barbed wire fence that grabbed off most of their clothes. They didn't go to town, as they had planned; they did get back up the mountain just as the rest of us were starting, in time for us to see 'em."

"It was quite a settlement that we had at the 'old job'. At one time our school had 28 pupils and was the largest one in town outside of Wallingford village. A lot of our choppers were Canadian Frenchmen, and some of them had big families."

"The married men had houses of their own, but there was always a big boarding house for the single men. The woman who ran it was a fine all-round cook. Her pea soup was so good that she had to make a wash-boiler full of it twice a week to keep the men satisfied, and she was baking most of the time."

"We had a ball team that played the town teams near us and beat a good many of them. We never had any uniforms but played in our frocks and overalls."

"My wife has always said that she was never more comfortable than at our house in that lumber camp. Her father thought she was going to freeze to death on that mountain. So he came up and plastered her house. We'd bank it so high with sawdust every fall that the floors never got cold in the winter."

"We left all of the houses standing when we finished lumbering on the mountain. We thought hunters and fishermen would get a lot of fun out of them. But it wasn't long before they were all burned down. I left a boat on the lake but someone made a hole in it."

05/06: Paving bids will be sought for various streets this summer as well as Van Wyck bridge repairs; there was discussion about a set back requirement in the 2015 zoning bylaws that affect a zoning permit. 

RECIPE CORNER

Caramel Brownies

1 pkg. Swiss Chocolate Cake Mix 3/4 c. melted margarine
1 c. chopped nuts 1/3 c. evaporated milk

Mix above ingredients together. Put one-half in an ungreased 13x9 pan. Bake at 350 for 20 minutes. Then melt 1-12 oz. pkg. of Kraft caramels with 1/3 c. evaporated milk. Remove cake from oven. Sprinkle with 6 oz. of chocolate chips and pour melted caramel over chips. Put remainder of first mixture on top by dropping teaspoonfuls over the mixture. Spread and bake for another 25 minutes.





To be eligible for a passport, you must be: a resident of Vermont and 62 years old or older, or a Veteran of the uniformed services – provide form DD214 or see indication on driver's license (after 7/1/13). 




