
A NEW LOOK!

The Vermont Legislature recently passed language requiring the Vermont statewide education property tax and local municipal tax liabilities to be displayed side-by-side on property tax bills (see Act 11 of the 2018 Special Session). They are also requiring additional explanations on the reverse of the property tax bill and are changing the term "non-resident" to "non-homestead" throughout statutory language. The State has created this guide to help read your property tax bill: <https://tax.vermont.gov/property-owners/property-tax-bill>. 

Elfin Lake IS OPEN FOR THE SEASON!



East Wallingford Historical Site:

Railroad Section House Museum Open to the Public

A little bit of railroad history in East Wallingford will be open to the public this Saturday - Railroad Section House #14. Section houses were built at intervals along the railroad tracks to provide shelter, storage, office and sometimes sleeping accommodations for the railroad maintenance workers. The East Wallingford section house dates from the turn of the century. The building holds a special attraction - "Fairmont Motor Car Number 118" - rail maintenance vehicle known as a "speeder car". This gasoline powered vehicle replaced the original hand-pump car railroad workers used to travel along and maintain Section 14 of the rail line.

A collection of enlarged photographs and postcards of the East Wallingford rail station and rail road bridges dating from the early 1900's is on also on display in the building.

This historical site will be open Saturday, June 29, from 12:00 - 2:00 pm. It is located at the bottom of Sugar Hill Road, just around the corner and visible from the train crossing on Route 140 in East Wallingford Village. Parking is available behind the building, off Sugar Hill Road.

We were fortunate to have a dozen Rutland Middle School students and their teachers, Wallingford resident David Cornwell and Ted Lindgren, volunteer their time again this year. Last month they visited the Hill Roberts Cemetery and weeded and cut overgrown brush. They certainly made a difference; however, this cemetery needs more attention. A carefully re-arranged burial ground of about 150 graves, of which only 10 have readable stones, situated out of sight on a hill above Wallingford Crushed Stone on Route 7 in South Wallingford. Most of the weather-beaten stones are crudely shaped from local fieldstone and all markings have been effaced by time and the cattle which had grazed there for many years. The only modern stone is that of the Hill family which bears data on the last burial in the cemetery in 1901.

Memorial Day Speech 2019 at the Green Hill Cemetery given by Joe Will, U.S. Army Vet and current Pastor of the First Congregational Church of Wallingford

Several years ago the perfect teaching lesson took place at one of our National Cemeteries. Two of the uniformed attendants were preparing to close up the cemetery for the evening on the day before the Memorial Day weekend. Approximately 10 minutes prior to closing, an elderly lady appeared with a cluster of several small bouquets of flowers. As is the protocol, the attendant, in his Class A uniform, offered to be of assistance. She said her name was Joann Wieserman and she would be as quick as she could. She handed him the cluster of bouquets to carry with a warm thank you. He followed as she made her way to the WW1 section and laid a small bouquet on the grave marker for Donald Davidson, France 1918. She moved briskly (for her age) to the WW2 section and laid another small bouquet on the grave marker for Steven Davidson 1943. She moved up the row of graves and placed another bouquet on the grave marker of Stanley Wieserman, 1944. With a little help from the attendant, she found the Vietnam section and after a short search, placed a bouquet on the grave marker for Larry Wieserman, and the last one on the grave marker for Darrel Wieserman. She paused reflectively for a minute, then asked to be directed to her car, and apologized for keeping the attendant so long. The attendant could not resist asking if all those folks were kin. Her answer came from a strong voice, and tear glistening eyes, "yes, they were. Donald Davidson was my father. Steven was my uncle. Stanley was my husband, Larry and Darrel were our sons. They were all killed in action...and..." She stopped and pursed her lips and did not go on. With the pain of a lifetime, the tears of today, and a tidal wave of memories, she could only mutter "They just want to be remembered...that's my job".

I would submit, that's the job of all of us. How many folks walk the precision rows of grave markers in lands across the world to ever so briefly assure the fallen they are not forgotten? How many surviving kin have we consoled in their years of coping with a vacuum full of memories left by a missing loved one? How often have we taken the convenient route of forgetting? The breezes which blow over the many gardens of stone throughout the world are forever modulated with the quiet whispers of "remember me". We are here today to do just that. We must, however, make the remembering an enduring effort. One day a year barely salves our collective conscience. The music, the words, the pageantry will fade with the setting sun and return next year. For each marker across the world, a life has faded permanently. There is no annual holiday to mark the time for them.

The memories are solemn and spiritual, personal and community. Whether you are a believer, or an atheist, or something in between, thoughts of those lost are deeply moving for us all. We store them in the quiet recesses of our collective soul. There is a prayer, however, I think we can all endorse. For when you strip away the denominational rhetoric and the poetic verbiage, you are left with eloquent simplicity and our prayerful reply to the exhortations of "remember me". We must simply and frequently say "thank you.....thank you.....thank you.

Selectboard Meeting Highlights

06/03: The Board approved awarding the paving contract to Pike; the floor refinish project at Town Hall to Treditin Corp., signing the solar subscription from Thomas Hand, renewed dental insurance, accepted transfer of ownership of the Railroad Section House from the Historical Society, updated the Employee Handbook, directed Stan Taylor's property to be added to the grand list, accepted a resignation on the Planning Commission, approved the purchase of a new PC for the Zoning office, approved use of Elfin Lake before it opens for the season, and approved the transfer of the net profit from the 5k race to the Rec CD.

06/17: The Board approved: the sale of the Ford 550 to the only bidder for \$500, signing the Municipal Grants-in-Aid letter of intent for the implementation of best practices on roads, waiving the newsletter copying fees through the August edition, sending the road crew to a Nash Drive property to remedy road water runoff, the Rutland County Sheriff's contract (now 40 hours/week), appointments to the Planning Commission and Energy Committee, issuing a check to the Wallingford Fire District #1 as a deposit for the use of the Lodge on July 10th, and a new Grant Policy.





