form of a Vermont driver's license, bank
statement (or something with his/her
address) or any government ID.

It's Time to Register Your Dog

All dogs, six months of age or older,
must be registered annually at the Town
Clerk's Office by April 1st. A valid rabies
certificate must be submitted. We're
happy to issue licenses through the mail.
Fees are \$10 spayed/neutered;
otherwise, it's \$14.

Property Tax Adjustment

You may be eligible for a
property tax adjustment on
your 19/20 property taxes if
your property qualifies as a
homestead and you meet the
eligibility requirements. The
Property Tax Adjustment Claim
Form HS-122 is due April 15
Late filers are charged a late
fee.

Selectboard Meeting Highlights

1/06: Road Commissioner P. Baker gave an update on the Highway's winter activities and requested another possible equipment purchase in FY20. The Selectboard approved: 1) appointing Trisha Nash to the Recreation Committee; 2) reducing the Committee size from 7 to 5 members; 3) signing the note for the new loader loan; 4) accepting Jay Kenlan's resignation as Moderator as he's moved out of town; 5) agreed not to take any action on VT's commercial cannabis marketplace; and 6) signed an Emergency Mutual Aid Agreement to provide the added benefit of FEMA grant eligibility for emergency equipment rentals from neighboring towns
The Administration, Insurance and Revenue budgets for FY21 were reviewed.

1/20: The Selectboard approved: 1) The annual Certificate of Highway Mileage and Special Weight Limit reports; 2) 2021 budget; 3) appointment of Tammy Heffernan as Town Moderator; 4) Town warning with special articles 5) issuing two junk ordinance letters; and 6) using Town Hall for OSHA workshops. Road Commissioner P. Baker gave an update, and Town Clerk/Treasurer J. Sharon reported on the 2nd quarter financials. B. Duchesne recommended replacing the windows at Town Hall.

Green Hill Cemetery: In the January 11-12, 2020 Rutland Herald, on page A3, there was a short piece about a Cemetery Repair Fund being brought to this session of the VT Legislature by Chittenden County (R) Rep, James Harrison. James Harrison. Currently in the House Committee on General, Housing and Military Affairs, as well as the senate, it is any one's guess how far it will go. Modeled on a NY State measure, it would institute a \$5.00 fee on all burials and cremations and would be administered by the Vermont Old Cemeteries Association. It quoted Tom Giffin, president of the organization and Chair of the Rutland Cemetery Commission who said "Smaller towns lack funding to repair damage to their cemeteries. They barely have enough money to mow lawns in some places because people aren't using cemeteries. Cemeteries are becoming historical sites."

"Many of Wallingford's early settlers were buried in the Green Hill Cemetery, which was the village burial ground for one hundred years before the Green Hill Cemetery Association was formed in 1870. The front of the cemetery is bordered by a wrought-iron fence of square rails with pointed tops. There are two secondary gates, at the north and south ends, and a main gate in the center, consisting of one large entrance flanked by

two small ones. The main gate is marked by delicate, decorative, curved wrought-iron work. To the north and east of the main entrance is a pond with a two-tiered stone fountain in the center. The oldest graves, those dating from the 1770's, lie to the south of the main gate. Beyond them, gravestones march up the terraced landscaped hillside, creating a dramatic backdrop at the south end of town." (Language from original Register documentation) Green Hill Cemetery was listed as a contributing resource in the Wallingford Main Street Historic District in the National Register of Historic Places on 11/01/84. This designation can be highlighted in grant applications and donor appeal letters as confirmation of the site's historic significance and worthiness for preservation.

Recently, members of the Green Hill Cemetery Board met to discuss some ways to support the significant ongoing maintenance needs of this site not to mention other issues such as preservation and restoration that have been identified as critical to its future health. Initially, our plan was to develop a targeted capital campaign to bring in additional funds to shore up our perpetual care endowment equity. However, that goal immediately became only one part of our discussion.

It was felt that a generalized community awareness needed to be developed, and I have been tasked with contributing updates of our progress to this newsletter with the main goal of generating additional support in terms of expertise and energy from the broader Wallingford community by expanding the citizenry's knowledge and interest in Green Hill Cemetery. We will, at a later date, introduce some of the historical information both about the Green Hill's founding history as well as individuals buried therein.

I was asked to be on the Board of the Green Hill Cemetery when I purchased a lot several years ago. This decision was not hastily made. Most of my family on my father's side is buried in Mount Auburn Cemetery in Arlington, MA but the plot is full. My mother's immediate family, going back generations, is buried in historical Glenwood Cemetery in East Greenwich, RI and there is room there. However, negotiating the process to be interred seemed needlessly complex. I decided why not be buried in Wallingford?

Charlie Gauthier took us on a tour of the available real estate, which requires a bit of mental preparation to undertake. Needless to say, we fell in love with a small property and purchased it immediately. It will provide a resting place for those of our relatives who wish to join us at some point.

The trend towards cremation and final scattering of ashes in various beloved special spots, lends itself to the idea that one is in some final way, contributing to curb climate change. However, as a DAR member, Mayflower Ancestor, and indeed most recently an inductee into the Society of Daughters of Early American Witches (arising from my ancestor Anne Hutchinson), I cannot help but bemoan the eventual loss of family history that will result from this de-emphasis of monuments and markers that carry ancestral

information sought after by the casual genealogist. Granted, everything is digitized these days (<https://www.findagrave.com/cemetery/1972542/green-hill-cemetery>) and the details of one's forebears are generally made accessible online; but, in my mind, nothing measures up to planting one's feet next to the stone marking their parents and grandparents to conjure up the memories they provoke. So, I am planning for a stone. Would a bench be nice? How much would it cost to have a small sculpture of a watchful owl, for instance? Our names would not be terribly prominent but all the necessary info would be there for my descendants.

But, I digress. The point I am making is that yes, my connection to Green Hill is very personal but the good citizens of Wallingford have a connection too. We are historically obligated to preserve it as the final resting place for the founders of our town and fellow citizens through the ages.

Currently, Maintenance Superintendent, Curtis Lidstone, with coordination assistance from Lynne Edmunds, capably manages the routine maintenance work. Plot sales are handled by Superintendent Sandy Eddy. However, there remains a laundry list of needs if we are to provide for Green Hill's ongoing upkeep. As Board members, we need to develop a strategic plan to support the significant ongoing issues we have identified. Having volunteers with the necessary skills such as surveying and documentation, stone cleaning and resetting, and site maintenance can be a critical cost-saving measure in the restoration process. Accurate documentation of what is on the site is important as it creates a record to work from in the future. It should include all graves (marked and unmarked), pathways, walls, and fences (both for the perimeter and enclosures); trees and other vegetation; and any other features or buildings. Craig Niedzwiecki and Don Emery have agreed to digitize those written records that are available yet we could use some assistance with mapping and inventory. Stones need to be inspected periodically for wear-and-tear and gently cleaned of debris. They weather and naturally decay. Michael Murphy has volunteered to head up this initiative. Bill Brooks is interested in historic preservation and will help to develop this aspect. Bob Soule, Missy Whitmore, and I will continue to work towards mounting a capital campaign as our action planning progresses.



VETERANS EXEMPTION

Wallingford offers a \$40,000 property tax discount on the assessed value for some disabled veterans and their survivors. To be eligible, Veterans must meet one of the three criteria listed below:

- Receive Disability Compensation for a service-connected disability rated 50% or higher by the U.S. Dept of Veterans Affairs.
- Receive Improved Pension (also called Non-Service Connected Disability Pension) from the U.S. Dept of Veterans Affairs.
- Receive a permanent medical retirement from the military. Survivors must be the un-remarried spouse or a minor child of a veteran who met the eligibility criteria above at the time of their death. 


