

August Primary: The SOS's office will be sending postcards to all active voters this month. The postcard will explain all the ways you can request a ballot. You will be provided with a pre-paid envelope to return the ballot if you request one.

November General Election: All active voters will be mailed an absentee ballot in late September. Again, you will be provided with a pre-paid envelope to return the ballot.

We will still conduct each election upstairs at the Town Hall. You will still have the option to appear in person to vote if you choose not to vote by absentee ballot.

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
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WALLINGFORD SENIORS

SUMMER MEALS AVAILABLE FOR ALL MRUUSD RESIDENTS 18 AND YOUNGER

MRUUSD is pleased to share that our meals program has been approved for expansion to continue through the summer, ending on August 25, 2020. We will continue with the same schedule for distribution on Mondays and Thursdays from 7:00 am-5:00 pm. Pickup will continue at the MRUUSD Offices located on the MRUHS campus. Meals are available for all district residents aged 18 and under. We are pleased to be able to offer this opportunity to our community!



Hazardous Household Waste

The Rutland County Solid Waste District sponsors Household Hazardous Waste days at the transfer station each year. On Saturday, August 1 and Saturday, October 17 from 8:00 to 10:00 a.m., you may bring your household hazardous waste free of charge to the transfer station.

New restrictions this year from RCSWD: Due to the COVID-19 environment, certain changes in previous years' processes have been made to align with VBOH/CDC guidance.

Each participant must remain in the vehicle with a mask on. All materials to dispose of must be organized such that items can be placed on a table in little time. Do not use garbage bags. A staff member will process paperwork to include contact information. Participants will need to have a completed, in advance materials drop-off list. This materials list should be easy to read and it should detail each material with estimated volume.

When this is completed, participant will be asked to exit the vehicle and place materials on the table and maintain social distancing. Excessive materials will not be accepted and will be referred to the Gleason Road facility. Nothing will be returned (gas cans, etc.). Please leave your pets at home.

COVID-19 UPDATE

- The SB approved a COVID-19 Control Plan as mandated by the state. The Plan features requirements for visitors, including mandatory face masks, use of hand sanitizers, safe distancing practices, appointments for researchers, and a limit on the total number of people (employees and visitors) inside Town Hall at any one time. And of course, anyone feeling ill or those who have been exposed to COVID-19 or those who have been in close contact to anyone with the virus are not allowed in the building. Those municipal employees whose jobs allow them to work remotely will continue to do so.
- Elfin Lake will NOT be open to the public this year per orders of the Selectboard on May 4, 2020. There will be NO lifeguards, concessions or public restrooms.
- The Great Elfin Lake 5K race has been cancelled for this summer.

Selectboard Meeting Highlights

06/01. The Selectboard approved the road commissioner's request to purchase a culvert for Centerville Road; appointing Charlie Woods as temp road foreman in S. Lanfear's absence; reviewed a report of voter approved funds and their separate bank accounts; deferred decision on unused budget monies until the 7/6 meeting; reviewed the Investment Policy and semi-annual Investment Report; approved the state- mandated COVID-19 Control Plan; approved a maintenance chore list for the Lake this summer; approved the acceptance of appliances and construction debris at the Transfer Station, voted not to run the Summer Program this year; tabled a decision on holding a basketball tournament; voted not to hold Wallingford Day this summer as it would draw crowds; approved the annual agreement with NEMRC for assessor services; agreed to include review of the Driveway Policy at the next meeting; agreed to continue municipal meetings via Zoom; took no action on Recreation Committee appointments until a public forum is held to gather community input on bike trails at Stone Meadow; and approved employees carrying over unused vacation time as a result of COVID-19.

06/15. The Selectboard tabled the paving bids until the next meeting when the Road Commissioner can attend; approved next year's contract with the Sheriff Department; agreed to go out to bid on the new basketball court rehab; denied a request for new trees for Elfin Lake; approved the Conservation and Energy Committees meeting at Town Hall; reviewed the energy audit list for energy efficiency improvements at Town Hall; agreed to send out the annual letter to owners of unlicensed dogs; tabled a decision to apply for a grant for a stormwater master plan until feedback is received from WFD #1 and MRUUSD personnel; appointed Elaine Warzocha as Auditor; approved having the road crew spread chloride on East Street this week; approved a payout of some grandfathered Combined Time Off to C. Woods; approved a temporary increase for C. Woods who will assume the road foreman post in S. Lanfear's absence; and approved paying Summer Rec Directors L. Cotrupi and L. Roundy for work related to the summer program.

Wallingford Local Hazard Mitigation Plan

The Town of Wallingford's Local Hazard Mitigation Plan (LHMP) must be updated every five years. A committee comprised of Selectboard members Nelson Tift and Bruce Duchesne, Road Foreman Steve Lanfear, Road Commissioner Phil Baker, Town Clerk and Treasurer Julie Sharon, Town Administrator Sandi Switzer, and Wallingford Volunteer Fire Dept. Fire Chief Michael Hughes will work with Steffanie Bourque, Emergency Management Planner with the Rutland Regional Planning Commission (RRPC), on the update. A Kick-Off Meeting was held on June 9.

The purpose of the LHMP is to assist the Town in identifying natural hazards facing our community, ranking them according to local vulnerabilities, and then identify strategies to reduce risks from vulnerabilities of highest concern.

As the committee works through the update process expected to take several months, public hearings will be scheduled to seek input from residents and business owners alike. Your participation would be greatly appreciated. In the meantime, if you have any immediate questions or comments, please contact me and I will share your input with committee members.

The planning process will include; a Project Kick-Off Meeting with Planning Team; Compile Hazards Information & Complete Vulnerability Assessment; Present Hazard Identification & Vulnerability Assessment in Public Meeting; Develop Mitigation Strategy; Present Mitigation Strategy in Public Meeting; Submit Plan to Vermont Emergency Management (VEM) and Revise if Needed; Submit Plan to FEMA, Revise if Needed, and Adopt Plan.

The plan is expected to be finalized late fall.

Mill River Schools Community Members,

6/8/20

This has been quite a school year. It is hard to believe it is almost at its conclusion. MRU Seniors had their last day of classes last Friday, and are picking up their diplomas today and tomorrow have a virtual graduation video coming out this week as well. The rest of our students complete their school year tomorrow (June 9th). Our school district staff are engaged in end of year professional development for the remainder of the week. It's hard to know whether the end of this school year would have felt "faster" had we been operating in normal circumstances, but I can say personally that the last few months have both flown by and moved at a snail's pace, all at the same time. I commend each and every one of our students and families for your stamina and perseverance as we navigated our way to the end of the school year. Congratulations on the completion of an absolutely unforgettable 2019-2020.

We also extend our heartiest congratulations to the MRU Class of 2020. They are an extraordinary group graduating under extraordinary circumstances. We are proud of their accomplishments and excited for what is ahead for each and every one of them!

As we look ahead to summer, there are a number of important details for you to be aware of.

1. **Please keep an eye on emails** from either the school district or your respective school(s). We have no way of knowing what lies ahead, and communication will be important as we prepare for the fall.

2. **We are currently designing multiple options for school in the fall:** in-person with significant restrictions, fully remote (like now), and a hybrid version of the two, which I suspect is the most likely scenario. Our operations will be guided by Department of Health protocols regardless. It is essentially guaranteed that school in the fall will look very different than what we are accustomed to. There are currently no assurances at all about activities, sports, clubs, transportation, etc. There is no guarantee that we will be operating in-person. We are planning for every contingency we can and will keep you informed as things progress.

3. **As families travel during the summer,** please do not lose sight of the fact that we do not know what restrictions and possible quarantine regulations will look like come August. Be aware that if you travel, and depending on where you travel, your children may be required to undergo a quarantine period at home before returning to in-person schooling. The MRUUSD can't control your vacation plans, but please be cognizant of possible ramifications based on travel that occurs close to the start of the school year.

4. **Our school buildings will continue to be very restricted to access** through the end of July with August yet unknown. Principals, administrative assistants, and district office personnel will occasionally be in their offices but will for the most part continue working from home. Please utilize email as the most effective way to communicate with school personnel. If you have a question about who to contact about something, please email either your school principal or even me and we'll be able to direct you to the right resource.



June 2020 Legislative Update Rep. Dave Potter

It is an understatement to say the coronavirus epidemic has drastically changed the lifestyle of Vermonters since the emergency declaration by the Governor in March. The Vermont Legislature, like so many other organizations, is now meeting from home on Zoom. The Legislature expects to work thru the end of June to complete this fiscal year (FY) 2020 budget and put in place a budget for the first three months of FY 2021. The Legislature will reconvene in August to complete the last nine months of the FY 2021 budget when federal funding and VT needs are better understood. The Legislature is trying its best to meet all the unmet needs of Vermonters with regard to healthcare, education, broadband, unemployment, food security, homelessness, small business, agriculture, finances and much more. Funds to support all these critical needs (nearly \$900 million) have been appropriated thru the June timeframe, with more coming in the August session and beyond, to meet the unprecedented pandemic caused needs of Vermonters.

Since March, over 126,000 Unemployment Insurance and Pandemic Unemployment Assistance Claims have been submitted the VT Dept. of Labor (DOL). Over 83,000 recipients were deemed eligible and have been paid over \$287 million in benefits. This was not easy. The DOL was overwhelmed by the sudden sheer volume of requests, an antiquated computer system, and inadequate staffing. Most folks are today being served, but there were many frustrations from VT citizens getting to this point.

Schools were closed in March, but education continued online. Graduations suffered. Plans for the fall now include schools being reopened with new health precautions in place. The VT State College System and UVM are under unprecedented stress from the pandemic and declining enrollment. The Legislature intends to help get them thru this difficult time with financial support. School finance statewide has been thrown out of whack, and the legislature plans to intervene once all the dust settles.

The polls will be open this summer and fall as usual with extra health precautions put in place by our experienced town clerks. The primary election is Tuesday, August 11th. Voters will receive, on about June 22, a pre-stamped absentee ballot request postcard from the VT Secretary of State's Office to be mailed back to your town clerk should you choose to vote absentee.

The General Election will take place Tuesday, November 3rd. For this election, all voters will be mailed an absentee ballot and encouraged to return it to their town clerk before election day. This is intended to reduce traffic and health risk at the polls. But, remember the polls are open as usual, so anyone may vote in the customary way, should they choose or need to do so.

The very most important thing is for all our families is to get thru this pandemic. Follow safety guidelines. Take the threat seriously. A vaccine and end to the crisis is on the horizon.

You can buy a backyard composter and collection container locally or online. If you prefer to build your own composter, there are DIY projects online.

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

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
