Homestead Declaration

✓ If you are a Vermont resident, don't forget to <u>file your annual Homestead</u> <u>Declaration form</u> with the Vermont Department of Taxes, even if you do not have to file a state income tax return.

Dog Registrations

✓ Dog registrations have begun for 2024. All dogs, six months of age or older, must be registered annually at the Town Clerk's Office by April 1st. A valid rabies certificate must be submitted, and we're happy to issue licenses by mail. Fees are \$10 spayed/neutered; otherwise, it's \$14.

We will be holding our annual dog/cat rabies clinic in March. Watch for further details.

Voters can access specific information such as sample ballots and/or request absentee ballots on "My Voter Page" at: mvp.vermont.gov. If you aren't able to access it, check with us to make sure your voter record has your correct DOB and VT DL# or SSN last 4 digits.

ATTENTION! You must declare which ballot you want to vote in the Presidential Primary in March. Vermont law requires you to ask for a party ballot and for your choice to be recorded by the election official.



Every eight years, the Rutland Regional Planning Commission (RRPC) updates the Rutland Regional Plan, its visionary plan for the future of the region. RRPC is in the development phase for the 2026 Rutland Regional Plan and is seeking public input. The Rutland Regional Plan is a collaborative guide to shape a healthy, equitable and resilient region. The final document will outline policies and actions for achieving our collective goal as it relates to community economic development.

Over the next year and a half, RRPC staff will deploy several different outreach methods to engage with agencies and members of the public as they seek feedback on the priorities for the region. RRPC is asking residents to participate in the online survey. The survey will remain open through 3/31/24 and can be accessed through the following link: https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/RutlandRegionPlan2026.

Information collected will help inform a plan that features equitable policies to best serve the region's communities. The survey will be complemented by a number of public engagement activities, including community open houses and pop-up events. As these are scheduled, they will regularly be updated on the Rutland Regional Plan 2026 website.



Presidential Primary Election 101

What many people like about Vermont is that voters do not have to register with a specific political party. In State and Federal Primaries, voters may vote for whatever party they choose. Unlike the State Primary in August when voters get all available party ballots but may only vote on one party's ballot (discarding unvoted ballots when checking out), at the Presidential Primary in March, voters are required, by State Statute, to choose the party's ballot they would like to vote on when they check in at the entrance checklist, receiving only that ballot. Statute 17 V.S.A. § 2704 reads, "A person voting at the Primary shall be required to ask for the ballot of the party in which the voter wishes to vote and an election official shall record the voter's choice of ballot by marking the entrance checklist with a letter code, as designated by the Secretary of State, to indicate the voter's party choice. The names of all candidates on the ballot shall be listed in alphabetical order. Each voter may vote for one candidate for the presidential nomination of one party, either by placing a mark opposite the printed name of a candidate as in other primaries, or by writing in the name of the candidate of the voter's choice. (Added 1979, No. 199 (Adj. Sess.), §1, eff. May 6, 1980; amended 1995, No. 38, §4; 2003, No. 59, §43.)" What many people do not like is ONLY being allowed to vote for one party at the Primaries. People like to mix 'n' match their candidate picks. Voters should be rest assured that they may mix 'n' match party selections at the November General Election when there is one ballot for all parties.

The Covered Bridges of Nicholas Powers

A. Nicholas Strom-Olsen, the great, great, great grandson of famous covered bridge builder, Nicholas Powers, walked the audience through the life and works of Powers.

Nicholas Powers was born on August 30, 1817 in Pittsford, VT. He lived in Ira for a period of time and spent his final days in Clarendon. As Strom-Olsen explained during his presentation, Powers, who was self-taught, built his first bridge when he was 19 years old. That bridge, the Pittsford Mills Bridge, traversed the Furnace Brook and was built in the year 1837. It was removed in 1931 for road widening.

The Gorham Bridge, also located in Pittsford, traverses the Otter Creek and still stands today. It is one of the four still-standing covered bridges built by Powers in Rutland County.

The other bridges that still remain standing today are the Cooley Bridge over the Furnace Brook in Pittsford, the Brown Bridge over the Cold River in Shrewsbury and one of the Twin Bridges in East Pittsford, which is now on dry land and no longer used as a bridge.

Powers is known for building covered bridges that had covered sides, which became one of Powers' trademarks. Powers built Wallingford's own covered bridge over the Otter Creek connecting the two sections of Route 140, which was then referred to as a "quaint side road". Powers built the Wallingford bridge in 1874 and a streamside ledge outcrop served as most of the western abutment of the bridge. Wallingford's bridge was burned in 1949 when the metal bridge was erected in its stead.

Powers also holds the record for building the longest single span wooden bridge in the world. The bridge, located over the Schoharie Creek in Blenheim, NY was built by Powers in 1855. It is 232 feet long. It is contained in the Guinness Book of World Records.

The bridge was referred to as Power's Folly because during its construction, nay-sayers believed that the bridge would fall, being unable to support that long of a suspension. It was reported that Powers stood on top of the bridge when it was opened and stated that if the bridge fell, he would fall with it. The bridge settled less than one inch and withstood over 200 years. It was destroyed by Hurricane Irene when the concrete buttresses went underwater. There no longer being anything to support the bridge, it collapsed. A true tragedy.

In addition, to covered bridge building, Powers was responsible for building the Kingsley Grist Mill in Clarendon. This is the only mill designed and built by Powers. Ironically, the Kingsley covered bridge located next to the mill was not built by Powers. He also built the Cheese Factory and Creamery in Clarendon which is the present home of the Clarendon Grange.

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Selectboard Meeting Highlights

1/2. The Selectboard: 1) Heard an update on roadside mowing from the Road Commissioner; discussed Haven Hill Road trees and speed concerns, and river debris removal near Elm Street Ext.; 2) approved the Town Hall use requests for a play to benefit the library as well as a presentation for the elementary school; 3) discussed the FY25 draft budget for Administration, Insurance and Revenue as well as the new staterequired childcare contribution from employee wages; 4) approved the Ewaste contract extension with NERC; 5) discussed batteries for the flashing radar signs; 6) reviewed the annual town report dedication; 7) approved using the Revenue Augmentation Trust funding to pay down the new grader loan; and 8) heard a request from K. Luzader that the Fire District plow and sand the sidewalks on snowing/icy mornings.

1/15. The Selectboard: 1) discussed the plowing of upper Mill Street; 2) made no changes to the Annual Certificate of Highway Mileage report; 3) approved the proposed FY25 budget; 4) approved the Town Meeting Warning; 5) reviewed the Selectboard's report for the Town Report; and 6) discussed miscellaneous issues.

1/22. The Selectboard held a special meeting to revise the Town Meeting Warning to include the recent school board member vacancy.

Voters at Town Meeting in March will be asked to approve two special articles to establish and fund a Wallingford Asset Fund in order to pay for American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) projects, which were reviewed and recommended by the Town's ARPA Committee then approved by the Selectboard.

ARPA funds were distributed nationwide to every municipality to offset impacts from the pandemic. But the funds came with specific deadline requirements; the money must be obligated by 12/31/24 and spent by 12/31/26.

The Town intends to use these ARPA funds for projects like the School Street sidewalk replacement (currently in the engineering and permitting process) and to help purchase a fire truck and equipment for the East Wallingford Fire Department. However, those projects may extend beyond the 2026 federal spending deadline, posing a real risk of losing the money. Therefore, the Selectboard is following Vermont League of Cities and Town's (VLCT) two-step recommendation to preserve our ARPA Funds. First, the Selectboard was advised to transfer ARPA funds into the municipal general account creating a surplus in the current FY'24 budget year. The second step would be to create a Wallingford Asset Fund from the surplus, and that money would be used over the next few years for all of the ARPA projects approved by the Selectboard. Those projects include repairs to community water systems, flashing radar signs to be installed on Main Street and Route 140W, rehabilitation of School Street sidewalks, weatherization of Town Hall, digitization of Town Hall land records, and much more.

Transferring the funds allows the Town to report to the federal government in April that our ARPA funds have been spent, satisfying federal deadline requirements. The funds would no longer be at risk and the Town no longer has a deadline to spend the money, paying for the various projects.

The Selectboard took the first step and voted on December 4th to transfer \$466,789 in ARPA funds to the municipal general account to eliminate the risk of losing this money. Now they are seeking voter approval to establish and fund the Wallingford Asset Fund with the surplus, which would accomplish the second step. The Selectboard urges voters to approve Article V asking voters to establish the Wallingford Asset Fund and Article VI asking voters to fund it with the Fiscal Year 2024 surplus resulting from this one-time influx of

ARPA money into the general fund.





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


From Maria French: At the end of the summer, the Wallingford Day team gathers one evening to review how the day went and offer suggestions for the future while it's fresh in our minds. Then we leave it until the beginning of the new year when we start preparing for the next summer. As January grows closer, I always start to think more about what events and opportunities it could hold, and also, honestly, what it will take to pull it off.

"A few years ago, the residents of Wallingford were looking for a way to strengthen their town. Many of us might think that means new sidewalks or a business expanding. But in Wallingford, they kept coming back to the simple idea of just getting together. So, they brought back "Wallingford Day." A day to celebrate who they are, reconnect with neighbors with food trucks and fireworks, art shows and auctions, music and dancing. Most importantly, it's a day set aside to be together, a reminder that it takes effort to build community."

This, not just the WD mention but also being reminded of the generosity and community spirit across our state, was just the boost I needed to get excited about Wallingford Day 2024 and finally write this email to you all to invite you to our meetings.
